Store Robbed

PLACE OF BUSINESS AT LANDIS-VILLE LOOTED LAST NIGHT

The General Store of Mr. H. C. Greider Was Broken Open and a Large Lot of Shoes, Shirts, Cutlery and Other Aritcles Stolen-Gained An Entrance at Front Door

Mr. Greider's residence and place of business are in the same building and as a matter of fact his sleeping apartments are immediately over the store room. Not once during the night was he awakened but notwithstanding all this, when he opened his store for business as usual this morning he found that some time during the night robbers had cut a wood panel from the lower half of his front door, thereby gaining easy access. Thru this entrance they removed all the goods.
