THE 1911 TAX RATE REMAINS THE SAME

Messrs. J. N. Stauffer & Bro. Are Awarded the Stone Contract For One Year at a Price Below Last Year's—Other Business Transacted

Our Borough Dads i. e. Burgess Hoffman, President Brown and Messrs. Dillingier, Reist, Tyndall and Mumma with C. B. Hershey acting as Clerk vice R. Fellenbaum, met Monday evening and transacted regular routine business.
The report of the Burgess showed collections to the amount of \$62.50 for the past month.
Mr. Reist of the Street Committee reported having placed cinder on Poplar Street to a depth of six inches and that macadamizing would now follow as per instructions; a carload of Bolen brick ordered at \$25.40 per thousand. Mr. Reist recommended the laying of a crossing on North Barbara Street at Frank Street and relay the crossing on Barbara Street from the Exchange Hotel to the Union National Bank. Sewer pipe on Chestnut Street broken and recommended they be replaced with iron ones.
All the recommendations were ordered carried out. Mr. Reist also recommended that all ashes be hauled from April 15 to May 15. Ordered.
Mr. Dillingier of the Water Committee, reported a leaky hydrant at the C. Seltz property and a leaky pawehash at J. M. Brandt's, but that both will be promptly repaired. Recommended the cleaning of the reservoir this Spring and next Fall. Installed a new fire hydrant on Manheim Street. Received a bid for furnishing pipe for the Columbia Road and they were as follows: J. H. Buehl, \$12.40 per hundred for pipe and \$3.25 for a connection. Mr. H. S. Newcomer \$2c. a foot, for pipe and \$4.00 for the connection. G. Moyer \$11 3-4c. a foot for pipe and \$2.90 for the connection. Mr. Moyer being the lowest was awarded the contract.
Mr. Dillingier said the bridge over the tall race at pumping station was bad and should be repaired. Same was ordered.
Mr. Mumma of the property Committee, stated that they had asked for bids for painting the postoffice, but had not as yet received same. Decided to paint it white with green trimmings. Mr. Mumma suggested placing an additional window in the post office building on the west side and same was ordered done.
Pumping engineer Geo. Shatz recommended cleaning the subside.
Mr. Hoffer of the Board of Health presented the following:
To the Burgess and Members of Borough Council:
The year was marked by the most severe epidemic that has visited the Borough in recent years—that of typhoid fever. Forty-four cases were reported, of which five proved fatal.
The origin of the disease was traced by the State Department of Health Officials to a dairy farm near the borough, from which a local dairyman secured his supply of milk. The Borough water supply was also investigated and analyses of the water made at different periods, the result of which has not been obtainable from the Department, however. The water was pronounced impure, but it was not stated that typhoid germs existed in it.
The recommendations of the State Board of Health with reference thereto already form part of the official records of the Borough and need not be introduced here.
Of other diseases reported there were 25 cases of Mumps; 10 of Chicken-pox; 1 of Diphtheria; 5 of Measles; 2 of Pneumonia; 2 of Scarlet Fever and 1 of Whooping Cough.
The total number of deaths was 38, the lowest we have had. The number of births was 49, which is the highest since the registration law went into effect.
The number of homes disinfected was 66; the number of nuisances abated 2.
The general sanitary condition of the Borough was highly commended by the State Department of Health Officials, who were here during the typhoid fever epidemic.
The general health during the winter has been exceptional so far as reportable diseases are concerned.
The regular appropriation by Borough Council of \$25.00 was supplemented by a special appropriation of \$100 on account of the typhoid fever epidemic. Of this amount \$25 was given by the Board of Health to the local branch of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the General Hospital, to cover expenses incurred in providing nurses, medicines and food, where necessary demanded. Too much praise cannot be given this organization for the valuable aid given
