Farmers' Column

VALUABLE INFORMATION FOR OUR SUBURBAN FRIENDS

The Profit in Oats—To Prevent Crows from Distributing Corn Seed—Garden Seeder a Necessity—Good Garden Implements—Other Notes

Train the young tree in the orchard right from the start. Low headed trees are best; therefore prune from the top down and not from the bottom up.

Apples will not be overproduced until every man, woman and child in the land has had all the apples he or she can use, and gets them at a moderate price.

Before starting in fruit culture for market visit the progressive, practical fruit culturist and study details; also learn the cost of bushes, method of culture and the returns.

Diseased wood on a tree can never be made new again. Cut it off and allow another shoot to grow. Every day that such wood remains on a tree adds to the liability of losing it.

It is an excellent plan to whitewash the trees, filling the cracks of the bark with lime, so as to fill up the hiding places of fruit pests, as well as to destroy many which are hiding.

Hints for the spring: A few drops of gasoline applied with a medicine dropper to the heart of each dandelion plant will, it is claimed by several who have tried it, kill the weed quickly.

Good garden implements are essential for successful gardening. Much of the benefit and pleasure derived from work in the garden is missed by having poor tools. Spend part of your leisure in getting the tools in shape.

The question of the proper amount of seed to sow is never settled. Two and one-half bushels of average oats, sown broadcast, not too much on average land and average season, and one-half bushel less when drilled in, is looked upon as about right by most oat growers.

The garden seeder is a cheap and practical farm tool. Once one has used it he will not be apt to return to former methods nor to regret the small outlay of its first cost.

The most practical kinds have cultivating attachments that make the ordinary hoeing of the garden a much less laborious task. There is no tool in the up to date farm that pays a larger annual return in the investment.

Thorough tarring of corn will to a great extent prevent pulling by crows and blackbirds, but perhaps gophers and ground squirrels would only laugh at it. Moisten the seed with warm water, then stir in coal tar at the rate of a teaspoonful to the peck, being sure to stir until every kernel is black. Dry with ashes, land plaster or slaked lime.

Much interest is shown in the selection of seed wheat and corn; but, as for oats, people generally seem to think that anything that is called oats will do for the seed. The oats have become so debilitated and weak by constant reseeding year after year that it requires almost perfect conditions from the time they are in the ground until harvest to secure a fair yield. The constitution of the plant has been seriously weakened, with the result that any unusual climate conditions reduce the promise of the crop. During the past two seasons oats that started under favorable conditions and looked promising have fallen away wonderfully and failed to maintain the early promise in the face of weather conditions that were unfavorable, such as a little too much rain followed by excessive heat, which has produced in many instances rust and in other instances where there were no signs of rust they have been injured by excessive heat. It seems that if the seed had been properly selected the plant would have withstood these troubles. Last season the best oats were raised in Michigan. For years farmers have been careless and failed to give proper attention to the selection of the seed and then to the proper preparation of the soil. The careless sowing of oats on corn stubble is expensive. Where possible the corn stubble should be removed by fall plowing. No effort should be spared toward getting the soil in good condition. If obliged to use seed raised on the farm the small light weight oats and wild seeds should be blown or cleaned out. Get the fanning mill working, and work it hard. Late planting is a bad feature. 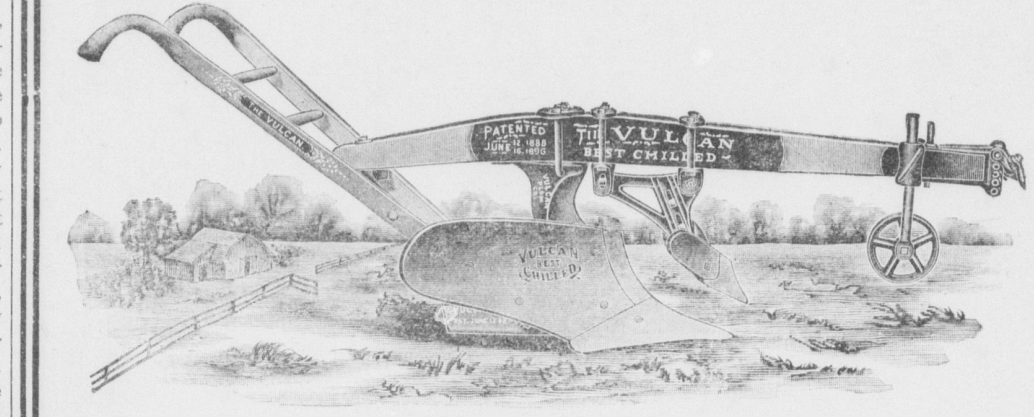
