FOR NEW TROLLEY

Mortgage for Large Amount Was Filed Yesterday

In the recorder's office yesterday morning there was entered a mortgage for \$250,000 by the Middletown and Elizabethtown Street Railway Company to the Harrisburg Trust Company trustee. It covers whatever rights the company has for a street railway from Middletown to Elizabethtown and all the road and equipment when completed. The road will pass through Middletown borough and Londonderry township Dauphin county, West Donegal township and Elizabethtown borough, in this county. The mortgage sets forth that the proceeds of the sale of the bonds accompanying the mortgage will be used in the construction and equipment of the trolley line. It is signed by Dr. H. K. Blough of Elizabethtown, as president, and Frank H. Alleman, of Summit, N. J., as secretary.
