Kauffman & Son, milk, \$4.98; Bube Estate, ice, \$1.60; Gifford DeLong, watching, \$74.10; Frank Good, watching, \$24.98; Dr. Chandler, drugs as per Dr. Richard, \$4.35; C. N. Mumma, meat, \$5.23; Harry Brooks, green groceries, \$1.83; R. G. Heilig, bread \$2.29; A. B. Root, asparagus, 40c; Morton & Myers, groceries, \$24.69, a total of \$146.01. The bill was paid and the annual appropriation of \$25 was made to the Board of Health.

Mr. Shultz was then granted permission to connect with the water main outside the borough limits by the unanimous vote of Council.

The report of the treasurer showed a balance of \$1,869.32 in the Borough account and \$3,409.52 in the Water account.

It was then decided to paint all the fire hydrants in the town green. A number of bills were paid and Council adjourned.

Council met Monday evening and every member answered the roll call. Burgess Hoffman vetoed the second order for the laying of a crossing on Barbara, north side of Main, at the Union National Bank because the location was not stated. His action was sustained.

By his report it showed that the Burgess had a "big" month, his collections totalling \$737.37.

The new bond for the collection of the 1911 taxes, with Messrs. C. R. Myers and F. L. Richards as bondsmen was presented by Tax Collector David Boyce thru Burgess Hoffman. The bond was for \$3,500 and was accepted.

Mr. Reist of the Street Committee reported work thruout the town progressing and gave grades to Mr. Charles on Poplar street, Mr. Herzog on South Market, and Monroe Lindemuth on South Barbara street for new pavements.

The deed for the alley on the east side of the Old Mennonite Church on West Donegal Street, was presented by the trustees of the Church and accepted.

Teachers Elected

MOUNT JOY BOROHO ELECTS FOR ANOTHER YEAR

The Adjoining Townships Also Elect—The Local Term and Tax Rate Remains the Same—Prof. I. R. Kraybill Re-elected Principal at an Increased Salary

The Mount Joy Borough School Board met on Monday evening and re-elected Mr. G. Moyer, president; Mr. H. S. Newcomer, secretary; and the First National Bank, treasurer. The Board will meet on the first Monday evening of each month at 8 o'clock. The school term was fixed at eight months for the grades and nine months for the High School. The tax remains the same, 7 mills and school will open Monday, Sept. 4.

Salaries now as follows: Principal, \$1,200; First Assistant, \$70; Second Assistant, \$60; First Primary, \$60 and all the remaining grade schools \$55 per month.

It was decided to have the school library open one hour a day for two days a week during the vacation period and same will be under the supervision of the principal, Prof. Kraybill. The board will remove the fence around the school grounds on Delta and Marietta streets and a fine concrete coping will be placed in position in its stead.

Tax Collector David Boyce presented his list of delinquents and was exonerated from collecting \$66.32. The Board starts the year with a balance of \$22,613 against \$218,331 last year. The election of teachers resulted as follows: Principal, Prof. I. R. Kraybill; 1st Assistant, Miss Marguerite H. Herr; 2nd assistant, Miss Mabel Donaven; Grammar, Miss Anna R. Kraybill; Intermediate, Miss Elizabeth R. Eshleman; Secondary, Miss Edna Martin; 4th Primary, Miss Lou Kuhns; 3rd Primary, Miss Verna Chandler; 2nd Primary, Miss Ruth N. Stoll; 1st Primary, Mrs. M. G. Miller; Music teacher, Mr. W. D. Keeney; Janitor, vacant.

There are three new teachers on the above roll. Miss Elizabeth Eshleman, of Elizabethtown, has been teaching thruout Mt. Joy and East Donegal townships. Miss Edna Martin comes here from McCall's Ferry and Miss Verna Chandler, daughter of Druggist W. D. Chandler of this place.

Tax rate as before for school purposes 7 mills, for building purposes 1 mill.

East Hempfield

The East Hempfield school Board met on Saturday at Rohrerstown to elect teachers for next term. It was decided to close two of the township schools, those at Lake Mill and Sunnyside. The East Petersburg building will be remodeled during the summer. It will be made a two-story building and of the four rooms three will be occupied. The pupils of the Sunnyside school will go to the new building. The average attendance of the Lake Mill school has been twelve the past year. The pupils will be transported by trolley to Landisville, less than two miles away. The salaries will remain the same as last year, except that the Landisville grammar will be increased to \$60 and the East Petersburg grammar will be increased to \$65.
