FARMERS AND NEW LAWS
Prohibits Certain Cruelties Which Are Practiced Upon the Cows Can't Neglect Them

Two acts passed by the recent state legislature and signed by Governor Tener, one of particular interest to the farmers of this and other counties throughout the commonwealth. The one act authorizes the issuing of search warrants and the other prohibits certain cruelties upon cows.

Text of New Law
 The new law authorizing the issuing of search warrants as follows: Section 1. That any police officer or any constable of any city or county or any other peace officer or agent of any society or association for the prevention of cruelty to animals duly incorporated under the laws of this commonwealth who shall make oath before any justice of the peace, alderman or magistrate that he has reason to believe or does believe that an act of cruelty to animals is being committed in a building, barn or other enclosure, the said justice of the peace, alderman or magistrate shall thereupon on proof of demand having been made issue a search warrant directed to any police officer or constable of any city or county or any agent of any society or association for the prevention of cruelty to animals duly incorporated under the laws of the commonwealth or other peace officer to search the said premises and if upon such search it is found that an act of cruelty to animals is being perpetrated to forthwith arrest such offender or offenders and bring him or them before the said justice of the peace, alderman or magistrate for trial.

Section 2. That if upon such search any creature or creatures be found upon such premises in a neglected or starving condition the officer making such search shall immediately take action to have said creature or creatures properly fed and watered and if he finds it to be impossible to give said creature or creatures proper care on the premises to have same removed to a safe place where proper food, water and attention can be given. All costs in giving said creature or creatures care food and attention, to be paid by the owner and the person taking same in charge shall have a lien thereon for the expenses of keep to be paid before the same can lawfully be recovered or any part thereof remaining unpaid may be recovered by the owner of said creature or creatures in any section thereof.

Providing that no search warrant shall be issued under the provision of this act which shall authorize any officer, policeman, constable, agent of a society or other person to enter upon or search premises where scientific research work is being conducted by or under the supervision of graduates or reputable scientific schools or where biological products are being produced for the care or prevention of disease.

Kneading or Padding
 The act of May 6, provides that any farmer, dealer or drover, or any other person who shall knead or heat the udder of any cow or who shall wilfully allow it to go un milked for a period of twenty-four hours or more for the purpose of enhancing the appearance or size of the udder of said cow or who shall by a muzzle or any device prevent its calf from suckling shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before any alderman, magistrate or justice of the peace shall be sentenced to pay a fine of not more than \$25 or to undergo an imprisonment in the jail of the proper county for a period of not more than thirty days or both at the discretion of such alderman, magistrate or justice.

Farmers' Column
VALUABLE INFORMATION FOR OUR SUBURBAN FRIENDS

Success Depends on the Man and Not on the Section of Country a Man is In—Evaporation and Harrowing Scours in Pigs—Other Notes.

A young woman 20 years old, manages a frog farm in Alameda county, Cal. It consists of two acres of swampy land, but produces a fine profit at from \$2 to \$3 per dozen.

Frog cabbage makes an excellent feed for cattle, but it cannot be safely fed to horses. Mangels, carrots, beets and turnips will, however, be found good for both horses and cattle if fed raw. They are named here in order of their value.

It is well to have a trough in the hog house in which are kept wood ashes, salt and coppers. There is little danger of the pigs being troubled with worms with this simple preparation.

Scours in pigs is readily overcome says an authority, by giving each a raw egg and five to ten grains of subnitrate twice daily in addition to changing the food of the sow and mixing coppers in her food. When this does not promptly cure give a dose of castor oil, shaken well, in milk. Set right all errors in diet and sanitation and give the pigs dry, sunny, well ventilated quarters.

If I were to come onto your farm and set 750 teams to work for a week hauling water onto a quarter section at the rate of four tons a day I would then only put on as much water as evaporates in a week when there is a good moisture content in the soil. This is the striking illustration that President Worst of the North Dakota Agricultural College gives of the tremendous amount of water that escapes by evaporation. He then concludes: A thorough harrowing will stop this evaporation and save that amount of water.

The entertaining stories that are published from day to day about people who have accomplished astonishing things by moving to some other part of the country do not always serve a good purpose. It depends mainly on the man himself whether he is going to prosper anywhere or not. The many alluring things which are published to attract farmers are designed first of all to sell the land. They are not issued from philanthropic motives, and the individual will always find that success depends on his own efforts and intelligence, no matter what his environment may be. It is interesting to learn of old friends who have "made good" in a new locality and it is pleasant to think of the good times we might have in some other climate or on some other kind of farm, but we must not forget that the lure of the big farm, the fruit ranch, the mild winters and other faraway things have been fatal to scores where it has drawn one to affluence. When a man is east he is apt to think that the west offers him golden opportunities. When he is west he sees the advantages of the Eastern markets and transportation. If he has been drawn south he may discover that the warm climate takes the tuck out of him, while in the farm north it may turn out to be too cold for a comfortable living. The truth is that all sections of this republic are good and all have special advantages. In the last year the price of produce has taken a great jump and the little farm idea has on this account been especially boosted. This straightway shows what advantages the Eastern farmer has in being surrounded by the great markets and the numerous railway lines. The thousands of city men who feel the need of a country home can see many advantages in the east. At the same time the newer sections offer possibilities to young and ambitious farmers that the old localities do not seem to contain. This article is not to make invidious comparisons but simply to point out that reasonable energy and fair intelligence count for more than the mere matter of location. A new era has been reached in farming. There is a new prosperity which will enhance and add to the dignity of the profession. It is more than ever a question of brains however. Diversified farming is a greater and more urgent proposition today than ever before. By this system alone can the agriculturist strike the market right and put his affairs on a business basis. We are to see the business side of farming from this on and those who have the talent to swing themselves into line with new conditions will be heard from no matter where they live.


