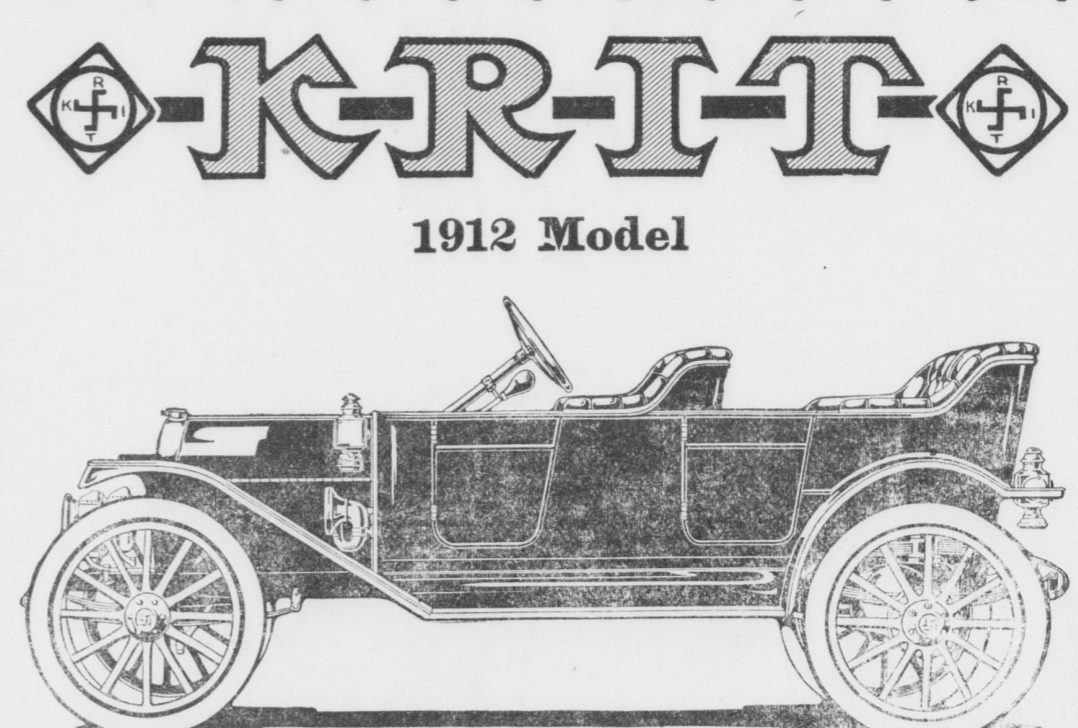


SALUNGA
