## Farmers Meet

**THERE WAS A LARGE ATTENDANCE AT RHEEMS SATURDAY NIGHT**

Talks on Timely Subjects—Addresses Given on Culture of Potatoes and Growing of Alfalfa in Both of Which Farmers Are Much Interested

The Rheems Branch of the Lancaster County Farmers' Association met on Saturday evening in the Rheems school house. There was an unusual large attendance of members and interested persons, every seat being taken and many persons being compelled to stand.

Talks by Home Members  
After the reading of the minutes B. F. Garber, president, called on members of the Home Association, at Mechanicsville, to give talks on the benefits of the association.

W. S. Kilheffer spoke on the rights of farmers to organize and to purchase what they needed through cooperation. He also told of the methods employed for the executive committee of the association to save all possible for the members.

The secretary of the Home Association, M. G. Brubaker, of Fruitville gave a talk on the principle of the greatest good for the greatest number. He dwelt on the growth of the association from twenty-five to 1,000 members. Mr. Brubaker spoke of the financial and social sides of the association. He said that during the six years of the association's existence there has been great progress in the farmers' work.

David Huber, of Fruitville, one of the pioneer members of the Home Association, gave a talk. He referred to certain opposition against the association, but said that it will be soon overcome. He thought that the cooperation of the farmers' wives would aid very much.

Martin Shenk dwelt on the benefits of the association and the exchange of ideas of all kinds by the members. He believed that the exchange of ideas is a great thing.

Clarence Kraybill gave a very pleasing recitation "My Mother," which was well received.

"Potato Culture"  
A talk on "Potato Culture" was given by Ezra G. Gish. He said that the disposal of potatoes should be considered as well as growing them. There should be a more systematic basis for potato growing. Sometimes it looks as if this county does not grow potatoes. The trouble is the county farmers do not grow enough potatoes and have a system for their disposal. Excuses given for not growing potatoes are that the soil is not adapted and that the land is too high. The speaker believed these excuses were not good ones. He said the seed is the most important thing in potato growing. Not enough attention is paid to seed potatoes. The majority of farmers sell all their large potatoes and plant the small ones, when the opposite should be observed. The speaker exhibited a number of potato stalks to illustrate his talk. There may be times when planting small potatoes will do. The temptation to plant small potatoes is great when a farmer has a lot which he cannot sell. The speaker dwelt on the change of seed and the methods to be followed. He told at length of the effects of zones on the growth of potatoes. Potatoes from the north furnish good seed for planting in this section. The preparation of the soil is important and the planting should be deep. The first cultivation should also be continued. The market demands a round potato because potato cleaners are used. Several years ago the speaker sold round potatoes for ten cents more than for long potatoes. The speaker said that one is not successful here and the same land advocated the planting of several acres in potatoes by each farmer. They can then organize for disposing of the crops. There are soils on different farms which are similar and the same kinds of potatoes are grown. Potatoes should follow corn, but many farmers plant in ploughed down sod land. Care must be exercised in the use of manure on potatoes. Spraying for blight must be immediate to be effective. Often the farmer mistakes leaf curl for blight. In conclusion, the speaker blamed the rain for the failure of the potato crop in this county. Other persons believed the hot weather, the borers, etc., were responsible for the failure of the crop. Some growers spoke of trouble with the potato grub. There was a discussion of the prices of potatoes, one grower reporting that he realized eighty-five cents for a peach basket of them.

Miss Anna Gish then favored the audience with an essay on the formation of the earth and the vocation of the farmer. Comparison was made between city and country life and the importance of keeping the children on the farm was dwelt upon.

Growing of Alfalfa  
J. G. Reist gave a talk on "Does it Pay the General Farmer to Grow Alfalfa?" He prefaced his remarks with references to the interest of the P. R. R. in the farmer and the benefits of organization. He said that it will pay to grow alfalfa. This county is one of the greatest buyers of concentrated food stuffs. Alfalfa may be fed to all kinds of live stock as they all like it. Mr. Reist read extracts from newspapers and bulletins on the food value of alfalfa. The speaker said his first cutting was forty-five tons from twenty-seven
