

**Game Laws**

THE OPEN SEASON FOR GAME IN THIS STATE

For the Benefit of the Sportsmen in Our Community We Have Compiled the Fish and Game Laws That Will Interest People in This Section—Rabbit Season Opens Nov 1st.

There seems to be considerable uncertainty as to the fish and game laws now in force in this state. Following is a complete and correct digest of the law that should prove valuable to sportsmen:

Table for fish, time of taking number and size to be taken in one day, etc. All with rod and line or handline, having not more than three hooks attached.

Trout, any species save lake trout, not less than 6 inches, 40 in one day. Limited to one rod and line, April 15 to July 31, inclusive.

Black bass, large or small mouth, not less than 8 inches, 12 in one day June 15 to November 30, inclusive.

Rock bass, white bass, strawberry or green bass, crappie, not less than 6 inches, 25 in one day, June 15 to November 30, inclusive.

Blue pike, pike perch, otherwise called wall-eyed pike, or Susquehanna salmon, pickerel, not less than 12 inches, 25 in one day, June 15 to December 31, inclusive.

Muscallonge, or Western pike, not less than 24 inches, four in one day, June 15 to November 30, inclusive.

Striped bass or rock fish, not less than 8 inches, number unlimited, classed as food fish, to be taken at any time with rod and line or hand line, Sunday excepted.

Sun fish, river chubs or fall fish, classed as food fish, to be taken at any time with rod and line or hand line, Sunday excepted.

Table of animals and birds declared to be game in Pennsylvania. When they may be killed. The number.

Bear, unlimited, October 1 to January 1. Use of steel traps forbidden.

Blackbirds, all kinds, and doves, unlimited, September 1 to January 1.

Deer, male, with visible horns, 1 each season, November 15 to December 1.

English, Mongolian, Chinese and ring neck pheasants, 10 in one day, 20 in one week and 50 in one season, November 1 to December 15.

Ruffed grouse, commonly called pheasant, five in one day, 20 in one week and 50 in one season, November 1 to December 15.

Hare or rabbit, 10 in one day, November 1 to December 15.

Hanxarian quail, five in one day 20 in one week and 30 in one season, October 15 to November 15.

Plover, unlimited, July 15 to December 1.

Quail, commonly called Virginia partridge, 10 in one day, 40 in one week and 75 in one season, November 1 to December 15.

Raccoon, unlimited, September 1 to January 1.

Shore birds, unlimited, September 1 to January 1.

Snake, Jack or Wilson, unlimited, September 1 to May 1.

Squirrel, fox, black or gray, six of the combined kinds in one day, November 1 to December 15.

Webfooted, wild water fowl of all kinds, unlimited, September 1 to April 10. Not to be shot at before sunrise.

Wild turkeys, one in one day, two in one season, November 1 to December 15.

Woodchuck, ten in one day, 20 in one week and 50 in one season, October 1 to December 1.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION SUBMITTED TO THE CITIZENS OF THIS COMMONWEALTH FOR THEIR APPROVAL OR REJECTION BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA, AND PUBLISHED BY ORDER OF THE SECRETARY OF THE COMMONWEALTH, IN PURSUANCE OF ARTICLE XVIII OF THE CONSTITUTION**

Number One.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION**

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, so as to consolidate the courts of common pleas of Allegheny County.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendment to the Constitution of Pennsylvania be, and the same is hereby, proposed, in accordance with the eighteenth article thereof:—

That section six of article five be amended by striking out the said section, and inserting in place thereof the following:

Section 6. In the county of Philadelphia all the jurisdiction and powers now vested in the district courts and courts of common pleas, subject to such changes as may be made by this Constitution or by law, shall be in Philadelphia vested in five distinct and separate courts of equal and coordinate jurisdiction, composed of three judges each. The said courts shall be in Philadelphia designated respectively as the court of common pleas number one, number two, number three, number four, and number five, but the number of said courts may be by law increased from time to time, and shall be in like manner designated by successive numbers. The number of judges in any of said courts, or in any court, where the establishment of an additional court may be authorized by law, may be increased, from time to time, and whenever such increase shall amount in the whole to three, such three judges shall compose a distinct and separate court as aforesaid, which shall be numbered as aforesaid. In Philadelphia all suits shall be instituted in the said courts of common pleas without designating the number of the said court, and the several courts shall distribute and apportion the business among them in such manner as shall be provided by rules of court, and each court, to which any suit shall be thus assigned, shall have exclusive jurisdiction thereof, subject to change of venue, as shall be provided by law.

In the county of Allegheny all the jurisdiction and powers now vested in the several numbered courts of common pleas shall be vested in one court of common pleas, composed of all the judges in commission in said courts. Such jurisdiction and powers shall extend to all proceedings at law and in equity which shall have been instituted in the several numbered courts, and shall be subject to such changes as may be made by law, and subject to change of venue as provided by law. The president judge of said court shall be selected as provided by law. The number of judges in said court may be by law increased from time to time. This amendment shall take effect on the first day of January succeeding its adoption.

**CHURCH OF BRETHREN CONFERENCE TO BE HELD AT YORK**

Will Use Fair Grounds. Annual Gathering in May, 1912

On Friday York was chosen as the meeting place for the General Conference of the Church of the Brethren of the United States, which will be held in May, 1912. This was decided at a meeting of the Southern Pennsylvania Conference in York. The only other town in the district which put up a fight for this large meeting was Gettysburg, but York won out by a vote of 24 to 6.

Strong pleas were made for Gettysburg by the delegates from that place and representatives of railroads leading to it. They promised not only accommodations for 10,000 people, but also offered to subscribe \$3,000 for the purpose of entertaining them. York, however, on account of better railroad facilities and the location of the York Agricultural Society's grounds, the use of which has been donated to the church was given the meeting. Fully 25,000 people will be in attendance during the conference, it is said.

The Rev. J. A. Long in announcing the reason for calling the special session of the conference told the delegates and visiting friends that a place for next year's General Conference was to be selected and that three places had been favorably looked upon in the southern part of the State, Pen-Mar, Gettysburg and York.

The discussion was then thrown open to the delegates by the introduction of Arch McClean and Robert Miller, explained why Gettysburg should have the big meeting. They stated that the well known Springs hotel, one mile west of the town, would be put into first class condition for the conference sessions and that buildings for services and accommodation of 10,000 persons would be provided by the people of Gettysburg.

No representatives of York or Pen-Mar were at the meeting.

In the afternoon the attending members of the church visited the York county fair grounds.

The following committee on arrangements was appointed:

The Revs. J. A. Longenecker, York; C. G. Trimmer, York; C. L. Baker, East Berlin; E. S. Miller, Black Rock, Md.; and J. M. Mohler, Mechanicsburg.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION**

Proposing an amendment to section eight, article nine, of the Constitution of Pennsylvania.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in accordance with the provisions of the eighteenth article thereof:—

Amendment to Article Nine, Section Eight

Section 2. Amend section eight, article nine, of the Constitution of Pennsylvania, which reads as follows:—

"Section 8. The debt of any county, city, borough, township, school district, or other municipality or incorporated district, except as herein provided, shall never exceed seven per centum upon the assessed value of the taxable property therein, nor shall any such municipality or district incur any new debt, or increase its indebtedness to an amount exceeding two per centum upon such assessed valuation of property, without the assent of the electors thereof at a public election in such manner as shall be provided by law; but any city, the debt of which now exceeds seven per centum of such assessed valuation, may be authorized by law to increase the same three per centum, in the aggregate, at any one time, upon such valuation," so as to read as follows:—

Section 8. The debt of any county, city, borough, township, school district, or other municipality or incorporated district, except as herein provided, shall never exceed seven per centum upon the assessed value of the taxable property therein, nor shall any such municipality or district incur any new debt, or increase its indebtedness to an amount exceeding two per centum upon such assessed valuation of property, without the assent of the electors thereof at a public election in such manner as shall be provided by law; but any city, the debt of which now exceeds seven per centum of such assessed valuation, may be authorized by law to increase the same three per centum, in the aggregate, at any one time, upon such valuation except that any debt or debts hereinafter incurred by the city and county of Philadelphia for the construction and development of subways for transit purposes, or for the construction of wharves and docks, and the reclamation of land to be used in the construction of a system of wharves and docks, as public improvements, owned or to be owned by said city and county of Philadelphia, and which shall yield to the city and county of Philadelphia current net revenue in excess of the interest on said debt or debts and of the annual installments necessary for the cancellation of said debt or debts, may be excluded in ascertaining the power of the city and county of Philadelphia to become otherwise indebted: Provided, That a sinking fund for their cancellation shall be established and maintained.


