#### Were Not His Cattle.

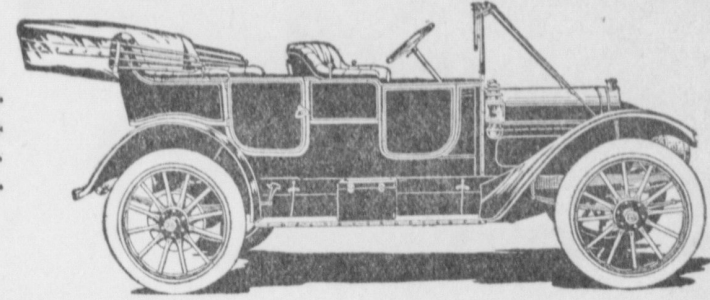

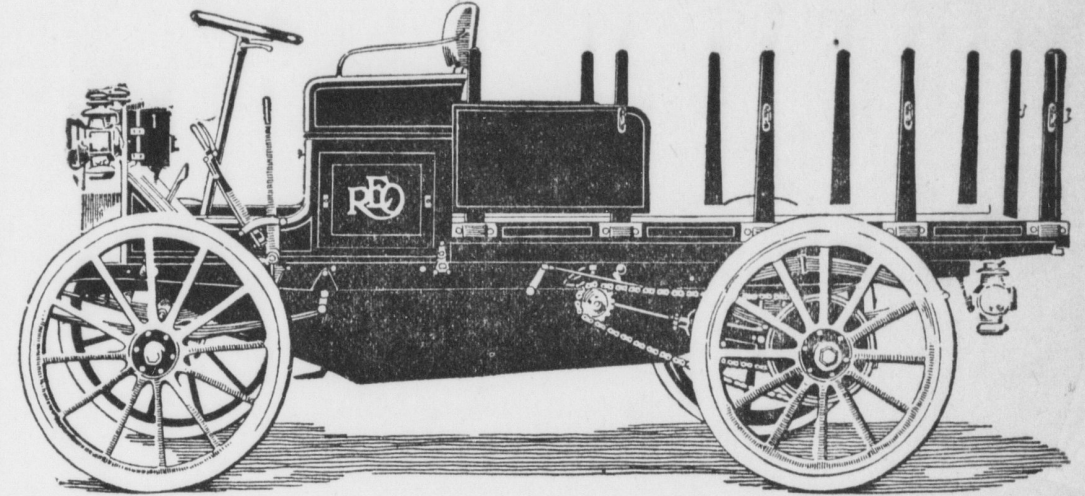

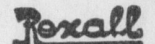
