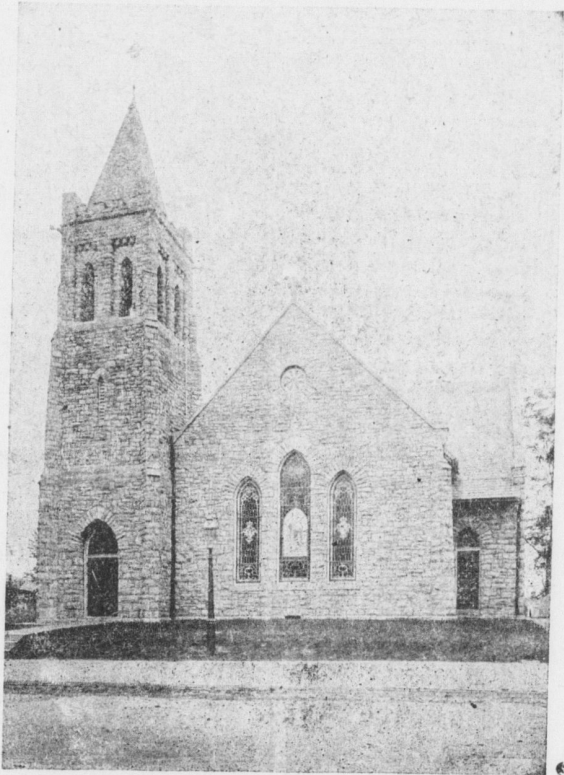
## Today's Convention
