A CHILD LOST

A Twenty-Six Months Old Babe Mysteriously Disappears

Archibald Ely, the 26-months-old child of Mr. and Mrs. Hiram Ely, who lives near Wild Cat Falls on the York county side of the river, mysteriously disappeared from his home last Wednesday afternoon.

An idea that the child might have been kidnapped was entertained and Frank Eising and his son George, of Marietta, were arrested on suspicion on Friday, but were later released.

It is now the general belief that the child is either lost in the hills or drowned in the Susquehanna river. Mr. Ely has received no demand for ransom, nor did he ever receive any threatening letters, so that the kidnapping theory does not seem plausible. However, the mother is still of the opinion that such might have been the case.

A child was found in New York on Friday in company with a strange man and is now in the custody of the police. A photograph of the child was shown to Mr. Ely and he said it resembles Archey. An investigation will be made.
