Cameron to investigate the death of John McFarland, of Marietta, who was found dead in the stable of Rieker's bottling works on Friday morning, returned a verdict that his death was caused by a shock from electric light wires of the Elizabethtown and Marietta Electric Light Company, located in the stable of the Marietta bottling works.

Death was due to complications, following a number of serious operations. A "BARE-FACED" LIE

Our Contemporary Tries to Besmirch Charles Hemple's Life With Murder Charge

Last week a nearby journal contained the following in an obituary notice of Mr. Charles Hemple, of the Back Run:

"Ten years ago when Isaac Stigler, of Back Run, was murdered, Hemple was arrested for the crime etc."

We have been requested by a large number of Mr. Hemple's friends in the vicinity of the Back Run to correct this gross error and have therefore gathered the following data:

Isaac Stigler was found dead in his hut along the Back Run road May 6, 1903 and indications showed that he met death the night previous. On May 8, 1903, on complaint made by E. K. Bennett, Mr. Lewis Siegle, better known as "Dutch Louie" and a German tramp Paul Smith by name, were arrested charged with murder.

The two men were heard before Squire Charles H. Zeller of this place and discharged by the local justice at the instigation of the District Attorney, for lack of evidence. Siegle was then sent to the County Alms-house.

In September, 1904 Mr. Siegle was re-arrested at the County Alms-house by the late Constable Donaghy of this place. He was brought here, heard before the late Squire Rieker, and sent to jail for court. In court the Grand Jury ignored the bill and Siegle was again discharged. He is still an inmate of the County Alms-house.

During this entire proceeding the name of Charles Hemple was not mentioned with the exception of being a witness for the Commonwealth at the first hearing. We saw the 70 pages of testimony of the 25 witnesses at the hearing before Mr. Zeller and the only questions asked Mr. Hemple were "whether or not he knew Louis Siegle had or owned a revolver."

This testimony and all the newspaper clippings from the Lancaster Daily News Era relative to the arrest, hearings, etc., was also shown us and in no single instance was Hemple connected with the murder with this one exception.

The testimony, clippings, bullet that caused Stigler's death, etc., were brought to town and are at the office of C. H. Zeller, where they may be seen.

The foregoing, we think should be sufficient evidence that the late Charles Hemple was never arrested for such a crime as our competitor would try and make one believe. Several papers in the County copied his article and we hope they will kindly correct.

Only a few weeks ago we were obliged to correct that "sheet" for trying to make people believe that a certain progenitor had 30,000 offsprings in four generations, but saying that an honest old German was arrested for murder is beyond all reason.

Official Count

SCHOCK'S PLURALITY OVER BOWMAN IS 8,138

Judge Landis, J. R. Groff, Enos E. Mowrer and David Swope Have Quite a Task in Compiling the Official Vote of This County—Vote on Amendments is Very Light

Judge Landis, with J. R. Groff as reading clerk and Enos E. Mowrer and David Swope as tally clerks, have finished compiling the vote of last Tuesday's election. There are yet several hundred certificates of election to be issued to the school directors elected throughout the county, which task, under the new school code, devolves upon the court.

The official figures show that the republicans show a plurality of 8,998 over C. G. Bassler, Democrat and Keystone. Judge Smith leads the ticket, and the other candidates for county offices have pluralities varying from about 8,200 to \$,900 with the exception of county commissioners, who run behind somewhat because of Republican voters who voted for one Republican and one Democrat or Keystone candidate.

F. P. D. Miller, Democrat, for minority commissioner, has a plurality of 794 over William B. Schneitman, Democrat and Keystone.
For Mayor, Frank B. McClain, Republican, has a plurality of 439 over Joseph S. Strickler, Fusion.

The vote on the constitutional amendments was very light, the first one receiving a majority for it of 663 and the second 396.
