A Crook

STRANGER PROCURING MONEY FROM RESIDENTS HERE—ABOUTS

He Tells a Real Good Story, Says He Is a Pipe Line Walker, Claims to be a Brother to Mr. Wm. Longenecker, Gives His Name as Hess and What Not

The authorities here are looking for a young man about thirty years of age, smooth shaven, weight about 150 pounds and about five feet, six inches tall. He gives his name as Hess, Longenecker, and various others.

Two weeks ago he called on Mr. Henry Martin of this place and gave the following story. He said he was a brother of Mr. William Longenecker, near town; was a pipe line walker and wanted to get to a certain point to which he was ordered by the company. All he said he wanted was his fare, telling Mr. Martin that his brother Mr. Longenecker would call in the morning and pay him the money. He finally gave Mr. Martin an order on his supposed brother. He also said that he was married to a Miss Martin, a daughter of Rev. Joseph Martin of Ephrata. Mr. Henry Martin, believing his story, gave the stranger \$3.00 and that was the last of it.

The above incident happened two weeks ago but ever since that time the crook has been working in this neighborhood. He called on Mrs. Shank, Mrs. Hershey, Mr. Garber, all of this place; Mr. Peter Brubaker and Mrs. Anna Witmer, widow of Samuel Witmer, of near town, and Mr. Jacob Hershey. Of the latter he secured \$5.00, telling practically the same story as he did to Mr. Martin. Only he gave a different name. He only received the money from Hershey last Friday, almost two weeks after he obtained cash from Mr. Martin.

It is quite likely that he called on and was given money by many persons whose names we have not yet learned, but the sooner he is brought to justice the better.

The authorities here and in the rural districts are now looking for this beat and if he is arrested there will surely be many complaints lodged against him.

Tested the Metres

Representatives of the Edison Electric Light Company tested all the light and power metres in town the latter part of last week. The test was made for the purpose of seeing whether they run "fast" or "slow". The entire line in town will soon be rebuilt, new poles and wires replacing the old ones. THE ROAD WHICH WE ALL MUST TRAVEL SOONER OR LATER

Some Well Known People From Our Neighborhood Have Passed to the Great Beyond Since Our Last Issue

Mrs. Marion V. Strickler, widow of the late Major M. B. Strickler, died at Columbia aged 66 years.

John James Bair died at Columbia from cordiac asthma. He was a veteran of the Civil War. The remains were interred at Marietta.

May M. Ginder, aged three years, a daughter of John E. Ginder, residing in Rapho township, near Mastersonville, died from croup after a short illness. The funeral took place on Saturday morning.

Elmer S. Gochenaour, Elmer S. Gochenaour died on Sunday evening at his home at Manheim, aged twelve years. His death was very sudden, and was due to injuries received about a year ago in a fall.

Captain John Smeltzer, Captain John Smeltzer, who lived at Wrightsville, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Michael Boreman at Bainbridge, aged 95 years. He was the oldest Odd Fellow in the county. The remains were laid to rest at Wrightsville.

John S. Breneman, The death of John S. Breneman, a former Lancaster countian, occurred in the State of Ohio on the 10th inst. Mr. Breneman was in his fortieth year. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Harriet Breneman, and the following sisters: Mrs. Doster, of Lititz; Mrs. Henry Andes, of East Petersburg, and Mrs. Elmer Brubaker, of this place. Funeral services were held from the home of Henry Andes, and at 10 o'clock at the Brethren Church in East Petersburg. Interment was in Erisman's cemetery.

Patrick Kelly, Patrick Kelly, better known as "Shorty," was found dead in a barn in Manor township where he had asked to stay that night. Heart disease was the cause of his death. Kelly was well known here and was a veteran of the Civil War. He worked among the farmers in this section and often called at local printing offices for exchanges when the editor was serving his apprenticeship. For our kindness, "Shorty" would often come around when he received his pension and "set 'em up" to the boys.

John H. Green, The funeral of John H. Green was held from the Church of God, Bainbridge, on Thursday afternoon with a large attendance. Mr. Green died very suddenly on Monday afternoon. He was wheeling a barrow when he fell over and expired in a few minutes. The deceased was seventy-five years of age and is survived by his widow and nine children. He was a member of Lieutenant Hippie Post, G. A. R., and Bainbridge Council, No. 231, O. U. A. M., both of which attended the funeral. Mr. Green was an active worker in the Church of God and was superintendent of the Sunday school for many years.

When the G. A. R. reunion was held here in September, Mr. Green was one of the many callers at this office.

Benjamin K. Minnich, Benjamin K. Minnich, who was born and raised near Landisville, dropped over dead on a road near Springfield, Ohio, on his way to his place of employment at the P. P. Mast woodworking shops. Heart failure caused death. In early manhood he lived with the family of the late Jacob H. Hershey. He married Miss Kate Helman, who was a member of the Hershey household, and for a number of years thereafter he operated the Locust Grove mills, near Bainbridge, for the Wiley family. In 1872 he moved to North Hampton, Ohio, where he conducted a saw mill until eight years ago, when he moved to Springfield. He was a prominent member of the North Hampton Knights of Pythias and took an active interest in the life of his community. His wife died but two years ago, and he is survived by a sister, Mrs. Anna Taylor, of Hampton, and three sons, David, Jacob and Wiley Minnich, all of Springfield, Ohio.
