"Dr. Krebs in his lecture in the Linden Hall gymnasium last Friday night kept his audience in the utmost good nature with his flashes of wit and humor while at the same time he instructed them in the workings of psychological problems. He opened his lecture by an incident in which he and another drifted in a boat at the island of Capri while admiring the sublimity of nature's enchanted handiwork and before they realized they were threatened with destruction by a treacherous tide. Only the hardest work of his life and the other man's for an hour took them out of danger.

It is easy to drift down stream, it is easy to do what everybody is doing; but to go against the current; to do that which no one has done before; to antagonize popular beliefs takes energy, push, determination and the exercise of these develops power.

Mr. Krebs made application of the principle through all phases of life in demonstrating the constructive and destructive principles. He went into the depths and heights of man's physical, mental and spiritual nature. He referred to the claim some make in the virtue of "going back to nature" and showed that man by nature is lazy, is inclined to drift and that a garden may be sown with good seeds, but it will be predominated with weeds if left to nature.

Business, politics and religion came in for their share of attention as well as man in his social relations and habits.

The illustrations used were apt, pointed and provoked outbursts of laughter and applause and every hearer was enabled to gather gems of philosophy to store in memory's garner for use.

Dr. Krebs has the happy faculty of mixing instruction with entertainment in such a way that the audience hungers for more. The person who can attend any of his lectures should do so as they are too good to be missed."
