

An Iowa Poultryman advises this method for keeping cabbage as a winter feed for fowls: As soon as severe freezing threatens, the cabbage should be pulled up and stored away. We adopt the simple method of burying them in the ground, usually right where they stood. The finest heads are reserved for the table and put to themselves and all the remainder of every degree buried down for the poultry. Covering them is quickly done by throwing out a trench with the plow that will admit three heads side by side, then another layer of two heads wide is placed on top of these with roots turned up in every case. Some straw or grass is then thrown over them and on top of this is a thin layer of earth, of a slope to shed off the rain Later on a heavier covering of earth may be added. Cabbage thus treated will continue to grow more tender, crisp and sweet and far excels in flavor the dry stored kind. With a range of green rye, a daily feed of cabbage and a warm mash in cold weather mixed with cooked turnips, beets or potatoes, the hens should be in prime condition to make a high egg
