> It Explained the Meaning of the Oft Recurring Fancy That a Cat Was Clawing the Slumberer's Throat. Rapidity of the Dream Process.

It was a personal experience of a singular character that first impressed upon me, some years ago, the importance of dreams as a subject for serious investigation, says H. I had suffered no pain, not even inconvenience, from the growth in my throat. In fact I had not consciously been aware of its presence. But unquestionably the organic changes accompanying it had given rise to sensations which, slight though they were had made an impression on my sleeping consciousness sufficient to excite it to activity. My recurrent dream consequently was to be regarded as a symbolic representation of the disorder in my throat-an attempt to interpret it, to explain it. And, indeed. even in the dream, for all its fantastic Imagery and symbolism, the seat of the trouble was indicated plainly enough as I could appreciate after the surgeon had completed his labors.
