### The Week in Grain

An uncertain trend prevalent during the early days of the week was superseded by a decided upward movement during the closing days when new high prices for the crop were established. This change had its inception with a constantly improving foreign situation but the impelling force was provided in the preliminary estimates of farm reserves. Snow originally estimated farm reserves under a hundred million, but this was subsequently corrected by the inclusion of twenty million Spring Wheat which had been inadvertently omitted. Even on this basis it is somewhat startling in its face and compares with one hundred and eighty million a year ago. Notwithstanding this change from first hands the visible is showing a decrease which is now under a year ago and the exports, which have been large, promise a continuation and our home consumption, constantly enlarging, makes for a bullish domestic situation. Receipts as primary points have shown a decrease, and the news of the week was mainly in favor of the bulls. Missouri sent reports of damage and Tennessee conditions are said to be the worst in years. Trade journals recognize the damage in the soft winter wheat sections.

If preliminary estimates on corn are confirmed a greater consumption than a year ago will be disclosed. The crop started with a deficiency of three hundred and fifty millions compared with a year ago and the price considerably above. Climatic conditions have not been favorable for the maturing of corn and this has tended to retard shipments which are expected to show an increase later. This cereal, however, proved the feature of the week and repeatedly advanced to new high prices for the crop. The trade is bullish with speculative interests unable to reconcile the price with the statistical position.

Oats ruled steady to firm all of the week. The strength in the other cereals eclipsed oats, but its price reached approximately the best for the movement. Receipts ran well above a year ago with an estimate of farm reserves two hundred millions under the previous year.

To a committee of the Lancaster Chamber of Commerce which called on State Highway Commissioner E. M. Bigelow at Harrisburg last week to ask for the early commencement of work on the Lancaster county roads in the Sprout plan Mr. Bigelow told of the material aid the automobilists of the State are giving to the good roads movement. The extent of which the autoists are helping the good roads movement in Pennsylvania financially is perhaps not generally known. Commissioner Bigelow stated that the estimated receipts from the sale of auto licenses and tags from fines, etc., for the years 1912 and 1913 are one and a half million dollars, or over thirty per cent of all the funds available for road work during that period. There has been a truly marvelous increase in the receipts from this source in recent years and it is still growing. Commissioner Bigelow will make a personal inspection of the roads in Lancaster County and promises that work will be commenced on some of them during the coming summer.

### Prohibiting Poisonous Matches

Another bill which has been much neglected is the Esch bill introduced by John Esch of Wisconsin, which prohibits the use of poisonous phosphorus in the manufacture of matches. Where this poisonous ingredient is used, the employees of such factories frequently get what is called the 'phossy-jaw' from the touch of the phosphorus which destroys the jaw bone, thereby depriving such victims from the use of jaws in chewing their food. This 'phossy-jaw' is more terrible than death itself because it is horrible lingering death, and it is singular that Congress has not had sufficient regard for the welfare of the public to have caused it to pass this bill before now. Especially in view of the fact that the difference in cost between the poisonous phosphorus and the harmless kind is very small.

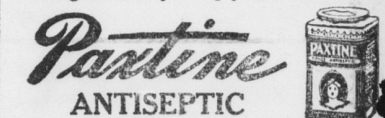
