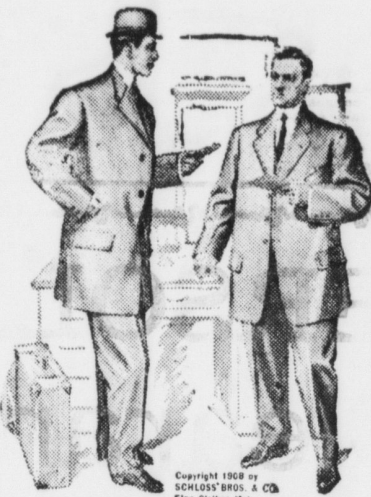

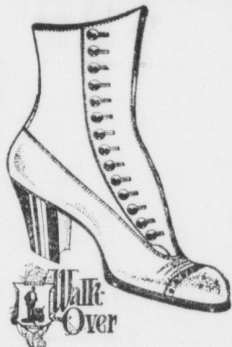

## Rheems Farmers

SESSION HELD ON SATURDAY NIGHT IN THE SCHOOLHOUSE

Views Expressed in Care of Farm Machinery and Proper Training of the Boy—Programme Arranged for Next Month

On Saturday evening the March meeting of the Rheems Farmers was held in the village schoolhouse, P. S. Kraybill presiding. Three new members were added to the roll.

**Care of Farm Machinery**  
"How to Take Care of Farm Machinery" was the subject discussed by S. S. Risser, of Florin. The speaker believed in keeping machinery in the dry when not in use. It should be repaired when put away so as to be ready for use when wanted again. Machinery wears more from weather than from usage. Mr. Risser said he has seen binders out since harvest.

Mr. Kraybill also believed that machinery is too often allowed to stand out. This is true of plows. Frequently time is wasted because machinery is not ready for use. The speaker favored greasing plows, seed drills, etc., when put away or giving them a coat of oil. All machinery should be kept clean.

**Training of the Boy**  
The next subject discussed was "What Should be the Proper Training of the Boy?" Mr. Kraybill said that too often the home is not made pleasant for the boy. If things are not made attractive and pleasant for the boy he will not stay on the farm sometimes the boy has his mind made up not to stay on the farm and nothing can make him stay. Boys who are hired help should not be treated as outcasts, but like sons of the farmers. By working together good will follow.

It was Mr. Risser's opinion that hired help is no longer treated as outcasts, as they formerly were. Frequently they, as well as the children want to boss the farmer who employs them. In many highly respected families controversies crop out on account of the children. Frequently the boys do not want to follow farming. If the boy is not satisfied nothing can be done to keep him at what the parents or employers want him to do. The boy seeks the employment he has a liking for. Frequently pictures, books, etc., and home surroundings influence the boy when he thinks of employment. Very often the boy has a liking for an honorable vocation, but had companions lead him astray. For this reason the company the boy keeps must be looked after.

The remainder of the meeting was devoted to the transaction of miscellaneous business and the question box.

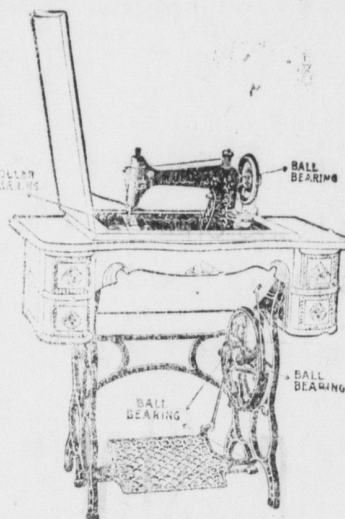
