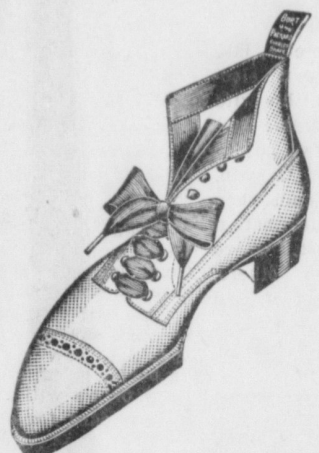

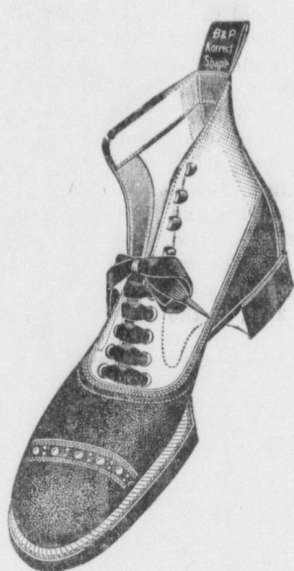

Farmers Column

The Cure of the Honey Makers—An Effective Rat Trap—The Solution of the Farm Help Problem—The Returns from an Acre of Ground

The amount of capital required to launch an energetic farmer in the hog raising business is not great, and if care is exercised, fair profits will be obtained the first year.

A farmer near Husum, Wash., owns 50+ acres of undeveloped land covered with oak trees which he has fenced hog tight. Last year he fattened 500 hogs on acorns, feeding only \$300 worth of grain.

A Kansas City newspaper employed an experienced gardener to grow vegetables on one acre of land and during the first year he produced \$1,600 worth of vegetables at a net profit of over \$1,100. It is a fine example of what may be accomplished by highly scientific farming.

A pioneer farmer living near Kendallville, Ind., while plowing unearthed a nest of bumble bees. The insects made such a vicious attack upon him that he was unable to escape and his relatives found him lying dead near his team. His head and neck and hands being covered with stings.

The solution of the farm help problem lies largely with the farmers themselves, according to my way of thinking. If farmers will arrange their work or reorganize their methods so they can keep men all the year around instead of picking up Tom, Dick and Bill as they stray out into the country during the season of harvest, pay all they can afford, give the men good living quarters and help them to keep out of the mire of ignorance and indifference by encouraging the better side of their nature, they will not only secure a higher type of workman, but perform a real service to humanity. Just keep in mind that we are brothers all—rich and poor—farmer and hired man—and that every man is entitled to a square deal—A Hired Man.

A simple but effective rat trap can be constructed in any barn by simply setting in a dark corner a watertight barrel, with the head knocked out and the top made accessible to the rats by placing boards near it or arranging boards or poles so as to enable them to climb up, says the Northwest Homestead. The barrel needs to be filled about two-thirds full of such rubbish as corn cobs and chips and something put on top to entice the rats. After they become familiar with the surroundings and resort to the barrel regularly, which they will in about a week if present, the barrel should be cleaned out and filled about three-quarters full of water; enough chaff should then be thrown in to cover the water and with it a block of wood, on each side of which a piece of bacon has been tacked. This will induce the first rat to jump in to eat the bacon, the next one will not hesitate to do likewise, and there will be a fight for the possession of the block. The noise will attract other rats, and when they get in, no matter how many there may be, up to a certain extent they will all drown.

Put your bees in a sheltered place until next spring. They should be sheltered from both the wind and the sun. Probably the best place to keep them through the winter is in an empty building. There is no danger of bees freezing in the coldest winter if they are protected from the wind. When not protected during a blizzard they are often frozen by the chilling wind. If the sun strikes them a cold spell coming immediately after warm weather finds the bees unprepared for it. Changes in temperature also cause the bees to eat more honey than when an even temperature is sustained. Thus, if the food supply is short, there is danger of them starving before spring opens bloom. When an empty building is not available straw is often packed around the hive and held in place by a box a little larger than the hive. This is not so satisfactory, for bees are often forgotten after a snow storm and are smothered before the snow melts from the entrance. If they are given plenty of food and good protection in the fall and then left alone there will be a vigorous swarm ready to make honey in the spring.

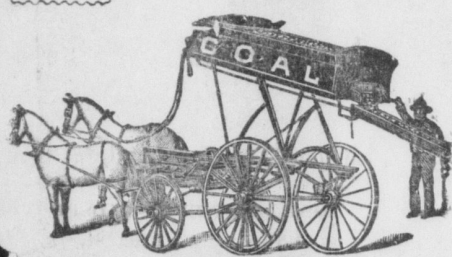
