thing could possibly be. General John F. Hartranft was elected governor of Pennsylvania on his merits as a soldier and public officer by a Republican plurality of 34,368 in October, 1872. A month later the same State gave General Grant a mapority of 135,000 for a second term of the presidency, but at the Republican State Convention in 1874 Mr. Allison, of Juniata

county, offered this resolution: "Resolved, That if General Grant be a candidate for a third term the Republican party of Pennsylvania

would support him." The Hon. O. J. Dickey, the successor of Thaddeus Stevens in Congress, opposed the resolution, and

"If General Grant desires a third term there is honesty and patriotism enough in the Republican party to stand by the precedent established by Washington. No man in this country ought to violate the example set by the father of his country. Should such a thing be attempted, the people with a unanimity with which they rushed forward to save the Union, would crush out the man who would dare to break down so wise a precedent. The people of Lancaster county are emphatically opposed to a third term.'

At the general election which followed, Mr. Latta, Democrat, was elected lieutenant-governor by a plurality of 4,679, despite the plurality of 135,000 cast for General Grant only two years before; and thus Pennsylvania set her face against a third term movement. Lieutenant-governor was the only State officer voted for that year in Pennsylvania.

The States of Massachusetts, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois gave an aggregate Republican plurality of 282,000 in 1872, but on the issue of a third term, as presented in 1874, that great plurality was overcome and a Democratic plurality was obtained instead of 141,000, a change of 423,000 votes in these seven States alone. The same ratio of Republican losses and Democratic gains applied to almost every State in the Union during that movement to bring about a third term of the presidency for Grant.

The disastrous results of 1874, brought about by the unwise attempt to force people to submit to a third term for General Grant, compelled the Republican party in many States to take the back track in 1875 on the third term question. Pennsylvania led off with this resolution at the State convention held May 8. at Lancaster:

"Resolved. That we declare a firm | and unqualified adherence to the unwritten law of the Republic, which wisely and under the sanction of the most venerable examples, limits the presidential service of any citizen to two terms; and we, the Republicans of Pennsylvania, in recognition of this law, are unalterably opposed to the election to the presidency of any person for a third term."

The New York Republicans in 1875 in State Convention resolved: "That we declare an unalterable opposition to the election of any

president for a third term." The Massachusetts Republicans resolved in 1875:

"That sound reason, as well as the wise and unbroken usage of the Republic-illustrated by the example of Washington, requires that the term of chief magistrate of the United States should not exceed a second term.

"That the observance of Washington's example, in retiring at the close of a scond presidential term, will be in the future, as it has been in the past regarded as a fundamental rule in the unwritten law of the Republic."
