## Anna Gible

Miss Anna, a young daughter of Henry B. and Amanda Gible of near Milton Grove, died on Sunday night from blood poisoning, aged 10 years, 3 months and 2 days. The funeral was held this forenoon with services and interment at Mastersville.

## Martin L. Greider

Ex-County Commissioner Martin L. Greider, widely known throughout the county, died at 1.45 o'clock Friday morning at his home on Marietta street, after a lingering illness. News of his death will be learned with deep sorrow by friends in all sections of the county, to whom he was known through his official life, and as an extensive and expert tobacco raiser and farmer.

Mr. Greider was born on February 26, 1842, in Rapho township, a son of the late Christian and Margaret Lindemuth Greider. He followed as a young man in the steps of his father, and conducted the paternal farm until 1893, when he moved to this borough, where he established a large farming implement business, under the name of M. L. Greider and Company, which he conducted ever since. He was active in Republican politics, and in 1899 was elected County Commissioner, serving two terms. Mr. Greider was an expert tobacco raiser, and one of the most active members of the Lancaster County Tobacco Growers Association. He worked industriously for the interests of the Lancaster county tobacco growers, both to improve the quality of their crop, establish higher standards for handling the crop and effect legislation to protect home growers from tariff tinkering. He was for a number of seasons in charge of the Government experimental stations in this county.

Mr. Greider was a member of the Lancaster Lodge of Elks. He was also a member of Mount Joy Borough Council for several terms.

Mr. Greider is survived by his wife, who was Miss Mary A. Shirk, and the following children: Samuel, of Rapho; Christian, of Harrisburg; and Lillian, wife of Jonas N. Hostetter of this place.

The funeral and burial was private and took place on Sunday afternoon, interment being made in the Eberle Cemetery. The body was viewed at his late home on Sunday forenoon by a large number of his friends.
