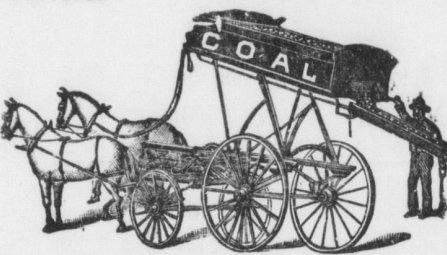

Farmers Column

USEFUL INFORMATION FOR THE FARMER

A Balanced Ration for the Dairy Cow—Deep Flowing Best—The Feeding of the Calves—Fresh Water for Cows—Seed Selection.

The object of cow testing and keeping record is to improve the herd and increase the output. The thermometer must be used as regularly in the dairy during the summer as during the winter.

Brain is a very good feed for cows. It is light, palatable and rich in mineral matter, especially phosphorus.

By intelligent breeding and care, most of the dairy herds can be brought up to double their production.

The spread between the common and good cattle keeps widening all the time, as good cattle are getting scarcer.

By kneading and rubbing the teats a good form may be given this organ and future milk secretions be much increased.

Prof. Smith of the Nebraska station believes that corn fodder is one of the most economical feeds for fattening steers.

By a careful selection and cultivation a Kansas farmer produced 500 bushels of oats from an eight acre field; an average by weight of 100 bushels to the acre. It is all sound and of the very highest quality.

When we consider that a large portion of the cow's body is composed of water; that milk contains more water than any other one ingredient, and that it must require a great quantity of water to keep the dairy cows well supplied with pure drinking water.

I am building a herd of registered Jerseys and do not have many calves to feed at a time. A very little calf meal in a gallon of warm separator skim milk three times a day is all I let any calf have till large enough to be put on some kind of coarse feed, says a writer in an exchange. I mix my own feed for my young dairy cows. I swap my cottonseed for cottonseed meal, grind my corn into meal, buy wheat bran and mix these equal parts. I sometimes use linseed meal with these equal parts. This linseed is used in the winter when we have no grass.

In raising a good crop it must be conceded that traction farming is far ahead of farming done with animal power. It is a well known fact and all agricultural authorities agree that deep plowing and the packing of the subsoil produce a better crop than is possible with the ordinary method of shallow plowing. It is almost an impossibility to plow deep with horses and the common horse plow because the entire outfit is too light to get down into hard soil. On the other hand, an engine is heavy and strong enough to secure good results. At the same time it is far cheaper to plow with an engine than it is to plow with horses.

In making up a ration for cows it is desirable to feed as much roughage as possible because it is usually the farmers' cheapest feed. However, the capacity of the animal is limited and we must be ruled by common sense. It is possible to balance a ration in protein, carbohydrate and fat with only coarse dry roughage which the cow would not be able to consume in large quantities to produce a reasonable amount of milk. It is easy to balance a ration of grain alone which is also undesirable. The ration should be balanced in amount of roughage and grain as well as in protein, carbohydrate and fat. The amount by weight should rarely equal the amount of dry roughage and should usually be less than one-half. This does not apply where such roughage as silage is fed, because silage contains more moisture and weight heavier than other roughage.

While planting your garden give due attention to the color of the flowers so that they may harmonize. Many a new and valuable implement is left out all winter more through carelessness than anything else.

Tobacco dust worked into the surface of the soil just before setting the lettuce will help to keep the aphids away.

These days can be put to good use in setting the grindstone into service and sharpening up things generally.

Ashes are best applied in the spring separately or in connection with phosphate fertilizers as a top dressing.

Cabbage is one of the easiest vegetables to start from seed and to transplant and to be made to grow in the garden or field.

The farmer who has an abundance of corn and no other grain will find it greatly to his profit if he will sell a part of his corn and buy other feeds to furnish a variety of rations for the animals, as their systems thus would be supplied with all the essentials necessary to proper growth and development and yet not require so much feed.

As early in the spring as possible prepare a piece of rich ground. When a good seed bed is made, drill in from one to 1½ bushels of barley or early oats per acre; or better still, a mixture of these. Be sure to use the barbed wire.

Then follow with a grass seed, sowing a mixture of four pounds Dwarf Essex rape, three pounds timothy, and eight pounds clover seed per acre. I have been using alfalfa, medium and mammoth clover but this spring shall include alfalfa. I cover the seed with a weeder, sometimes crossing. A light spike-tooth harrow will answer all so. If sown early, and the earlier the better, this light covering will be sufficient, as there is usually plenty of moisture in the ground at this time. When the rape is about six inches high, which will be in six to eight weeks, boys may be turned in; the rape, barley and oats should furnish abundant pasture for about 25 shotes per acre. In the meantime timothy and the clovers are growing to supplant the maturing barley and oats, and with the rape, will furnish a well balanced ration until covered with snow. This lot

will next year furnish the best meadow or pasture on the farm.

It is not always advantageous to plant the garden as early as possible. Under certain conditions Nature hastens the growth of late planted seeds so that the difference in time of their ripening will not accord with the difference in plantings. This is particularly the case when the season is late and rainy.

Plant for a succession of the different vegetables. A garden in which most of the planting is done about the same time will not give as good results as where a period of time elapses between the second, third or fourth plantings of the same vegetables. Particularly is this true of peas, says Farm and Home. Where a number of different varieties are tried the best results are obtained from one or two varieties planted in succession. In sweet corn, however, this was not so apparent. It was found best to rely on several varieties as well as successive plantings. If the season was backward or the planting made unusually early, sweet corn seemed to be very slow in growth. On the other hand, the corn planted later would grow very fast under favorable conditions and almost catch up with the first plantings. To overcome this difficulty it was found advisable to rely on the plantings of different varieties.

Rot is the worst enemy of peach growing in the southern peach belt. The self boiled lime-sulphur mixture has proved to be the best material to control it. This is made with eight pounds fresh burned stone lime, eight pounds sulphur and fifty gallons water. The lime is started slaking with hot water, then the sulphur is added and as soon as the slaking is completed cold water is put to check the cooking and the mixture is diluted to fifty gallons. Properly prepared, this is very effective, says a writer in Farm and Home, but much trouble has been caused by allowing it to cook too long, which results in more or less scorching of the leaves. The first application is made when the shucks drop from the little peaches and at this spraying two pounds arsenate of lead may be used with each 50 gallons to control the curculion. The second spraying is made three or four weeks later and the third and final application a month or more before the peaches ripen. Prof. J. S. Norton of Maryland was able to obtain 99 per cent of perfect fruit. Free from rot, black spot and curculion, by the use of this mixture. On the trees left unsprayed 50 per cent of the fruit rotted.

Why England Has Good Roads. The road makers of our country should copy to advantage the methods used in England, which country is now the best in the world. The English roadman has a list of instructions which he follows in the care of the highways. The principal rules which will follow will be found useful to the road makers of this country are as follows:

Never allow a hollow, a rut, or a puddle to remain on a road, but fill it up at once with chips from the stone heap.

Always use chips for patching, and for all repairs during the summer months.

Never put fresh stones on the road if by cross-picking and a thorough use of the rake surface may be made smooth and level at the proper strength and section.

Remember that the rake is the most useful tool in your collection and that it should be kept close at hand the whole year round.

Do not spread a large patch of stone over the whole width of the road, but coat the middle or horse track first, and when this has worn in, coat each of the sides in turn.

Use a moderate amount of water on hard roads, always pick up the old surface into ridges six inches apart, and remove all large and projecting stones before applying a new coating.

Never shoot stones on the road, and crack them where they lie or a smooth surface will be out of question.

Go over the whole of the new coating every day two or three times, and never leave the stones in ridges.

Never put a stone upon the road for repairing purposes that will not be free to move in every direction through a 2-inch ring, and remember that still smaller stones should be used for patching and for all slight repairs.

If you have no ring-gauge, remember Macadam's advice that any stone you cannot put easily into your mouth should be broken smaller.

Use chips for blinding newly stone roads, and remember that road sweeping, soil of grass, and other rubbish when used for this purpose, will ruin the best road ever constructed.

Remember that water-worn or rounded stones would never be used upon steep gradients, or they will fall to bind together.

Remember that the middle of the road should always be a little higher than the sides, so that the rain may run into the side gutters at once.

Never allow the water-tables, gutters, and ditches, to clog up, but keep them clear the whole year through.

Always be upon your road in wet weather, and at once fill up with chips any hollows or ruts where the rain may lie.
