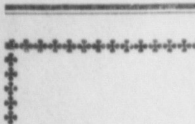

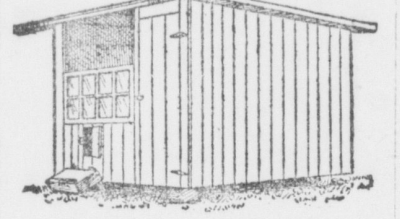
POULTRY
COLONY HOUSE IS PROFITABLE

Possesses Many Decided Advantages Over Permanent Houses—All Fixtures Made Removable.

Portable colony houses for the farm flock possess a decided advantage over the large permanent house. I make them, however, just as large as the weight will permit. My aim is to have them of such weight that they can be moved anywhere on the farm at any season of the year, writes J. T. Campbell in the New England Homestead. When hard and native lumber is used, the maximum size is 7x9 feet, with rear wall 5 feet 2 inches and front wall 6 feet 10 inches. This permits the use of 12-foot boards without waste, and buildings high enough to work in with comfort.

If light lumber is used in construction the cost is increased somewhat, and we secure the advantage of more room. We find the farm team can handle a 7x12 or 8x10 house of this kind. We use no upright frame at all. The building is operated by the vertical sliding. The runners on which these houses rest are made from 4x4 hardwood, and are placed the longer way of the house, set under 12 inches from each side and the ends flush. This keeps the runners from weather exposure, and if care is used to keep them blocked they last as long as the building. The one shown in the accompanying picture is the latest model. It is an object to provide for the admission of an abundance of fresh air without draft. In our earlier buildings we were compelled to use a curtain to keep out the storms or snow. We found this curtain more or less of a nuisance, and have gotten rid of it in the type of house shown.

The roof projects over the opening 2 feet and acts as an awning. It keeps out snow and rain, but admits plenty of air. Three sides of the building are lined under with a cheap grade of twoply roofing felt, which prevents any wind blowing through cracks and causing drafts. Single board floors are used. Perches are in the back part of the building, with dropping board under them. Nest boxes are under the dropping board to economize space. The water vessel is placed on a shelf 18 inches from the floor. I prefer to have all the fixtures, such as nest boxes, perches and dropping boards, removable. One of these little houses accommodates 30 to 35 Leghorn fowls.

Eggs From Pure-bred Fowls.

POULTRY NOTES

Feed lime and charcoal liberally. Do not breed from fowls that are too old.
 Millet seed is an excellent egg producing grain.
 Many poultrymen raise lettuce just for hen feed.
 An incubator will not trample on and break the eggs.
 A few undesirable eggs will lower the price of a whole crate.
 Cut clover hay has helped revolutionize the poultry business.
 Feeds rich in protein should make up a large part of the ration.
 A male bird is past his best stage after he has seen two breeding seasons.
 A lousy hen never thrives and daily attention should be given to keep lice and mites down.
 Alfalfa, green or the dry leaves, produces an ideal color in the yolk when the hens have an abundance of it.
 All eggs used for eating should be from hens that have no male birds running with them. Such eggs are infertile.
 It will pay the poultry grower to make a careful study of the color and quality of yolk that is demanded by the high-class trade, and then learn how to produce it.
 The poultryman should endeavor to feed all that the hens will consume and return a profit for it, and skill and experience are necessary to determine this amount.
 Eggs are bought by the dozen, but the poultryman who always markets large, heavy eggs soon gets a premium of 5 cents or more a dozen above the price for ordinary eggs.

LET PEOPLE RULE, SAYS ROOSEVELT

Opposes President's Attitude on Popular Government.
 PEOPLE'S VOICE MUST PREVAIL

Cheered For Speech in Opening Active Campaign For Nomination—Quotes Taft as Opposed to the Majority. Stands Squarely on His Columbus (O.) Address.

The salient passages in Colonel Roosevelt's forceful campaign speech, delivered in Carnegie hall, New York, Wednesday evening, are given below:

The great fundamental issue now before the Republican party and before our people can be stated briefly. It is, Are the American people fit to govern themselves, to rule themselves, to control themselves? I believe they are. I believe that the majority of the plain people of the United States will day in and day out, make fewer mistakes in governing themselves than any smaller class or body of men, no matter what their training, will make in trying to govern them. I believe again that the American people are as a whole capable of self control and of learning by their mistakes. Our opponents pay lip loyalty to this doctrine, but they show their real beliefs by the way in which they champion every device to make the nominal rule of the people a sham.

I have scant patience with this talk of the tyranny of the majority. Whenever there is tyranny of the majority I shall protest against it with all my heart and soul. But we are today suffering from the tyranny of the minority. It is a small minority that is grabbing our coal deposits, our water powers and our harbor fronts. A small minority is fattening on the sale of adulterated foods and drugs. It is a small minority that lies behind monopolies and trusts. It is a small minority that stands behind the present law of man and servant, the sweatshops and the whole calendar of social and industrial injustice. It is a small minority that is today using our constitutional system to defeat the will of a majority of the people in the choice of delegates to the Chicago convention.

Not For Recall Everywhere.
 My opponents charge that two things in my program are wrong because they intrude into the sanctuary of the judiciary. The first is the recall of judges and the second the review by the people of judicial decisions on certain constitutional questions. I have said again and again that I do not advocate the recall of judges in all states and in all communities. The integrity of our judges, from Marshall to White and Holmes—and to Cullen and many others in our own service, is a fine page of American history. But—I say it soberly—democracy has a right to approach the sanctuary of the courts when a special interest has corruptly found sanctuary there, and this is exactly what has happened in some of the states where the recall of the judges is a living issue. Is it not equally plain that the question whether a given social policy is for the public good is not of a judicial nature, but should be settled by the legislature or in the final instance by the people themselves?

The president of the United States, Mr. Taft, devoted most of a recent speech to criticism of this proposition. He says that "it is utterly without merit or utility, and instead of being . . . in the interest of all the people and of the stability of popular government, is sowing the seeds of confusion and tyranny." (By this he, of course, means the tyranny of the majority—the tyranny of the American people as a whole.) He also says that my proposal (which, as he rightly sees, is merely a proposal to give the people a real instead of only a nominal chance to construe and amend a state constitution with reasonable rapidity) would make such amendment and interpretation "depend on the ferocious, uncertain and unstable decision of the successive votes on different laws by temporary and changing majorities," and that "it lays the axe at the foot of the tree of well ordered freedom and subjects the guarantees of life, liberty and property without remedy to the fitful impulse of a temporary majority of an electorate."

This criticism is really less a criticism of my proposal than a criticism of all popular government. It is wholly unfounded, unless it is founded on the belief that the people are fundamentally unworthy. This is the question that I propose to submit to the people. How can the prevailing morality of a proposition be ascertained that is not in the opinion of the people by a vote of the people? The people must know better than the court what their own morality and their own opinion is. I ask that you, here, you and others like you, you the people, be given the chance to state your own views of justice and public morality and not sit meekly by and have your views announced for you by well meaning adherents of outworn philosophies, who exalt the pedantry of formulas above the vital needs of human life.

Mr. Taft's position is the position that has been held from the beginning of our government, although not always so openly held, by a large number of our statesmen.

GREEN FEEDS YEAR AROUND
 Nothing Better Than Well Cured Clover Rowen or Second Growth Clover Hay—Bran Is Substitute.

(By J. F. SCHUREMAN, U. S. Department of Agriculture.)
 There is nothing better than well cured clover rowen or second growth clover hay. This should be cut up fine and steamed. Clover is not only highly nitrogenous, but rich in lime, a substance required by the hens for providing shells for the eggs. Aside from alfalfa there is no other food that can take the place of clover. By allowing a ration of scalded clover to hens they will keep in better laying condition and the production of eggs will be increased. Where clover hay cannot be secured, bran is a very good substitute, though not so rich in mineral matter.

Vegetable food should be supplied the year around, such as cabbage, potatoes, beets and turnips.

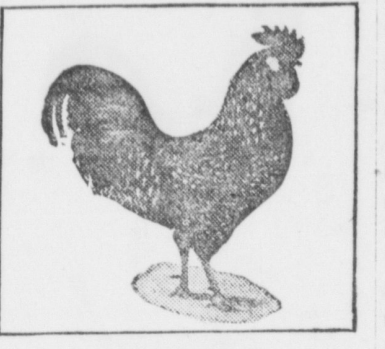

NOTED BREED OF CHICKENS

Fowl Imported From Europe Few Years Ago, Has Gained Much Prestige Among American Fanciers.

After studying all the good breeds I finally decided on the Anconas as coming nearer to Sheppard's standard of perfection than any other.

This noted breed of chickens, imported from Europe but a few years ago, has gained great prestige among fanciers in America, and yet more has it found a place in the estimation of those who look upon the utilitarian side alone of this beautiful, active and ever alert bird, says a writer in an exchange. Its attractive color, beautiful form and graceful carriage at once give it a place among the prime favorites of the coop, in the competitive show, as well as on the table of the preacher, and the crates of the egg producer.

I have known pullets to lay an average amount of 250 eggs each per year for the entire flock, and this in the cold climate of the northern states.

They are active and hardy and without doubt flourish best in close confinement of any known breed. Their eggs hatch the largest per cent. of all breeds, because of their superior hardiness. The chicks run forth from incubator or brooding hens as alert as matured songbirds.

Young cockerels often crow at the early age of six weeks. Pullets will frequently lay when 4½ months old when properly cared for. It is my firm belief that on account of their phenomenal growth they will produce more meat by the end of ten weeks after hatching than any other breed of this class, and even some of the larger breeds.

WINTER CARE OF THE DUCKS

Feed Any Green Stuff That Happens to Be Handy—Not Much of Any One Plant Given at Time.

During winter I feed my ducks any green stuff that I happen to have handy. Turnip, parsnip and carrot tops, cabbage leaves, beet leaves, onion tops, purslane, pigweed, tender crab grass, lettuce, radish, mustard, cut fine, all make good bulky feed. These are dried in the shade during the summer and stored like hay. When I want to feed them a quantity is boiled for 12 hours and mixed with finely cut roots, such as potato, turnip, parsnip, carrot, onion and beets. Apples are also used, says a writer in the Orange Judd Farmer. These are all cooked. Not much of one kind of plant is given at a time. Four measures of any one with four of corn chop, to each of wheat bran, red wheat shorts and boiled fresh meat are fed as a mash—all the ducks will eat up clean in few minutes. If any of the mash is left, it is at once removed to avoid its getting sour. This feed is given twice daily during the winter and three times in spring. It has always proved satisfactory.

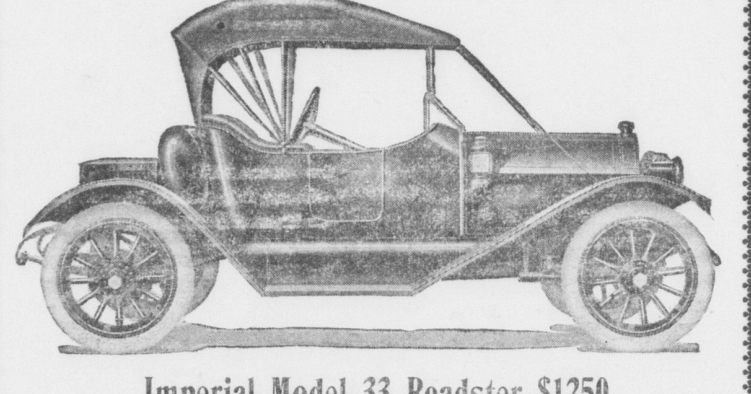
