### The Week in Grain

Weather and crop reports of favorable tenor found a market condition more vulnerable than a fortnight since, and rapid declines have featured in nearly every session. A sharp upturn Thursday morning followed the unexpected announcement that the Dardanelles had been closed, thus blocking the shipments from important ports of southern Russia, but even that day witnessed a severe decline from the higher levels established at the start, although the closing marked good recoveries from the previous session. With this exception, each day has experienced new low levels for the crop year.

There is undoubted improvement in growing conditions, especially since July 1st, when weather has been ideal from the crop standpoint. But there is the tendency to magnify at such times, and while the crop of the Northwestern states may be accepted as much above the average, present reports emanating from them may hardly be accepted at face value. Nor does the fact that crop losses in the middle west no longer feature as news, render them less important in the ultimate. There is the natural tendency in a trade way to magnify abundance at the harvesting period, and induce liberal movement from the new crop. This is the season of heaviest purchases from first hands and normally the low ebb of prices.

### AUTO CLUB MEETS

Road Superintendent Addresses Co. Autoists

The July meeting of the Lancaster Automobile Club held at the Eagle Hotel, Ephrata, on Friday evening was addressed by Martin E. Brenner of Witmer, State Highway Superintendent of Roads for Lancaster county, who outlined the work of the department on the roads under his charge and told of the difficulties confronting the department. Limited by the department to paying fifteen cents an hour for labor he is placed at a great disadvantage, farmers giving much more for labor. The allowance of sixty dollars per mile for maintenance of roads will prove inadequate for making badly needed repairs on the Beaver Valley Pike, the road between Ephrata and Reamstown and the road over the Gap hills. For these three sections of miserable road Mr. Brenner is endeavoring to secure a special appropriation or have the department make permanent repairs. Mr. Brenner asked that persons having complaints of roads should write to him and he will take up the matter with the department. He believed the road between Quarryville and Green Tree may be improved this year but the other State roads in need of repairs cannot be taken up until next year. Although the Department has taken over the roads in the Sprout plain supervisors are not forbidden to make repairs upon these roads. Mr. Brenner stated he would be very glad if the supervisors of the various townships would co-operate with him as they are familiar with labor conditions in their sections and can give him valuable assistance. Mr. Brenner thanked the club for the help it has given him, and he was tendered a vote of thanks for his interest in the club and for his efforts to improve the roads.

Report was made of a number of speed traps and on recommendation of President Wolf a committee was appointed to seek the improvement of a number of conditions in Lancaster, among them being the stationing of traffic officers at several dangerous points and a uniform stopping place for trolley cars on either the far or near corner instead of the present practice of stopping at some corners on one side of the street and elsewhere at the other side, which is confusing to drivers and a source of danger.

Upon invitation of ex-Sheriff Landis the August meeting will be held on the beautiful lawn of his home at Rohrerstown. The Ladies of the members will attend as it is the desire of the club to keep them interested in the affairs of the club. A special reception committee of five will be appointed by President Wolf for this meeting.

#### Was Appointed Superintendent

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Lancaster county Sunday School Association, Mr. Jas. A. Boehm, Secretary of the Lancaster County Young Men's Christian Association, was appointed Superintendent of the Secondary Division of the Sunday Schools of the county. The Secondary Division includes the boys between the ages of twelve and eighteen. Mr. Boehm, who knows the young peoples' work, will be a great help to the Sunday School workers of the County. During the last year Mr. Boehm toured the State of Massachusetts as a Sunday School and Boys' worker on the Men and Religion team.
