The program of the day will consist of addresses, vocal and instrumental music, recitations; besides the usual historical sketch by the family historian, Mr. D. B. Landis.

Horse Fatally Injured
A serious driving accident occurred on Monday evening on the Maytown and Bainbridge road, and as a result the valuable colt of I. O. Terry, of Maytown, is dead. The two horses had returned from Florin, and Mr. Terry had his son take the horses to the farm. They started at a lively gait, and became unmanageable and at the road near the turn on the Bainbridge pike, they struck the wagon of Samuel Hoffines who was coming in an opposite direction. The entire side of the colt was cut open. With considerable difficulty the horse was gotten home, and nothing could be done to save its life. Both wagons were overturned, and no one injured.

Arrested for Larceny
On Wednesday noon a young man who gave his name as Thos. Lane and who works among the farmers in these parts, stole a new bicycle and an overcoat from the stable of Mr. Joseph Charles, in this place. They were the property of his son Joseph, who was at once notified and got busy. The bicycle was found hidden in the hedge fence along the Columbia road, a short distance south of town, and the thief in the barn on the Hershey farm, tenanted by Mr. Samuel Holz-wager. A warrant was served by Constable Joseph Kramer. Lane was taken before Justice Charles H. Zeller and in default of \$300 hall was committed to jail for a hearing at 10:30.

Sammy Wasn't Guilty
A few days ago our local jeweler Mr. Samuel H. Miller, who is some motorcycleist, received word from Mr. George W. Green, Chief of Police at Reading, that the owner of motorcycle license No. 074, was charged with exceeding the speed limit at Reading a few days previous. As Mr. Miller has not been in that city since last fall, he notified Mr. Green to that effect and yesterday received an apology in the shape of a lengthy letter. The presumption is that some rascal uses the same license number as was given Mr. Miller by the state.

After Butter Tasters
The State Pure Food Department has put the ban on butter tasters and decreed that no longer shall people be allowed to indiscriminately dab into a roll of butter in a grocery or on a market stand with their fingers, or a knife, in order to ascertain whether it is alright. In Altoona, the department agent says he has seen five or six customers taste the same roll of butter with the same cutlery, and is convinced that it leads to tuberculosis, mouth diseases and other contagions.

She was in her seventy-seventh year, and had resided in Pittsburg four years. Mrs. Baker was born in Manor township and was the daughter of John and Barbara Witmer Kauffman. She was a resident of Landisville and vicinity all her married life. Her husband died in 1882. She was a member of the Mennonite church. Mrs. Baker is survived by the following children: John K. Baker, Abraham L. Baker of Landisville; Barbara K. wife of Jonas S. Hess, Pittsburg; and Rev. Frank K. Baker, Indiana. These step-children also survive: Andrew Baker, Illinois; Mary, widow of Benjamin Gochenour, of Maytown; Catharine, widow of Samuel Witmer, of Lancaster; Elizabeth Baker, of near Landis Valley; Martin Baker, of Lancaster; Emanuel Baker, of Columbia; Annie B. wife of Rev. John Lefevre, of near Landis Valley. A brother, Henry Kauffman of Ohio, and a sister, Mrs. Fannie Felker of near this place, also survive. The body was brought to Landisville on Monday morning and services were held at the Old Mennonite church at Landisville, at 10 o'clock, where interment also took place.

Mrs. Christian Rigel died on Monday night at her home at Kinderhook, from infirmities of age. She was born July 14, 1836. Mrs. Rigel was well and favorably known and had been a resident of West Hempfield township for many years. THE GRAPE LEAF HOPPER

Discussion of an Injurious Insect

"One of the injurious grape insects that should be destroyed before the middle of summer is the Grape Leaf Hopper," said State Zoologist H. A. Surface, of Harrisburg, recently. The Professor then continued to discuss this injurious insect as follows:

"The Grape Leaf Hopper can be easily determined by its effect on the grape leaves. It has a sharp, piercing bill, and does not eat holes in the leaves, but sinks its bill into them from the underside, but makes them turn gray at the point where pierced, so that when the leaves are observed from above they have a grayish appearance. This damage to the chlorophyll or green coloring substance of the leaves results in checking the growth of the vine and the development of the fruit. The fruit not only remains small and more or less shriveled, but at ripening time it is insipid or not well flavored.

The Grape Leaf Hopper is a small white winged insect that jumps and flies, and because of its small size is not usually observed. Because it does not eat holes in the leaves many persons fail entirely to make note of its presence. In applying remedies for it the grower must remember that this is not a chewing insect, and, therefore, Paris green, arsenate of lead and other arsenical poisons will do no good, as it sinks its proboscis well into the tissue of the leaf before it commences to feed. It is necessary to destroy this insect by a contact application, or some material that kills it by touching it or does not have to be eaten internally.

Among the best contact insecticides are whale oil soap and strong tobacco decoction. Spray just as soon as the pest is observed, with one pound of whale oil soap in five gallons of water, or strong tobacco decoction, or eight per cent kerosene emulsion. If whale oil soap can not be obtained the pests can be killed by using stronger solutions of laundry soap, or soft soap. In applying any spray liquid for the Leaf Hopper it is necessary to use a turn with the nozzle in such a way that the spray liquid will strike the under sides of the leaves. For this particular pest a nozzle throwing a large volume of spray is much better than one throwing a small volume, as the Hoppers can not easily dodge the large spray.

The auto was soon repaired and the occupants continued their journey to the seashore. They returned last Friday well pleased with their trip.
