ON THE STATE ROADS

Indestructible Signposts Will be Erected for Your Guidance

The first sign posts to be placed along the highways of Pennsylvania will be put into position this summer by the State Highway Department.

State Highway Commissioner E. M. Bigelow has let a contract for the first 1,000 sign posts, deliveries to begin next month. These posts will be of iron, with the name of the road or town to be shown in iron letters fused on iron plate, the direction to be indicated by an arrow

also of iron. This style was determined upon after extended investigation in other states and counties.

Although the posts and signs are practically indestructible any attempts to deface or injure will be vigorously prosecuted. Not only the state road maintenance officials, but local officers and citizens will be urged to prevent tampering with the sign posts because of their value to the public.
