Some Well Known People From Our Neighborhood Have Passed to the Great Beyond Since Our Last Issue

David Dennison died at the home of his son-in-law at Elizabethtown, in his 87th year. Interment was made at Maytown.
Rachel Landis Weitkamp
Mrs. Rachel Landis Weitkamp, an aged lady of this place, who made her home with Mr. Emanuel Greiner on Marietta street, died on Sunday noon from an apopleptic stroke, aged 82 years, 8 months and 29 days. She leaves three children as follows: Mrs. David R. Wagner, Mrs. Katharyn Dietz of this place and Mrs. Henry Witmer of Manheim. The funeral was held this forenoon at 10.30 with services from her late home and interment in the Henry Eberle Cemetery.
THREE MEN ARRESTED
By the State Livestock Sanitary Board Last Week.
The Wednesday evening edition of the Harrisburg Telegraph, contained the following:
The State Livestock Sanitary Board today ordered three arrests for alleged violations of the laws to safeguard the meat supply, the charges being different in each case.
E. M. Souders of near Elizabethtown, was charged with having sold meat from a cow that had been quarantined for tuberculosis and with making a false report as to disposition of the animal.
Peter Kelly, of near West Chester, was ordered prosecuted for testing cattle and not making reports about them, it being charged that he is not a legalized agent and is acting contrary to State laws, while S. G. Graybill of Elizabethtown, was charged with selling diseased cattle. It is also charged that Graybill tested his cattle before a State inspector came around and got rid of four which had been found affected. He will have a hearing in Lancaster on Saturday.
These arrests are the start of a number of prosecutions which will be made as the result of recent investigations by men connected with the board.
They Will Parade
At the regular meeting of Otsego Tribe No. 59, Imp. O. R. M., on Friday evening, the Tribe unanimously decided to go to Marietta with a band and participate in the parade there during Old Home Week, on Friday, Sept. 6. A committee of five is now making all arrangements.
Large Yield of Wheat
Mr. John Mumma, proprietor of the "Orinda Farm," East Donegal township, has the credit of raising one of the best crops of wheat reported from that section. On sixteen acres the yield was 572 bushels and the quality was superior to any produced in years.
Will Assist in Tobacco Work
Henry Kraybill of Elizabethtown, a student in agriculture at State College, has been engaged as an assistant to E. K. Hibelman and Otto Olson in their Government tobacco experiments in Lancaster and Clinton counties.
Mercantile Tax Collected
Announcement was made yesterday by H. C. Schock, county treasurer, that he had collected, with the aid of his deputy, B. F. Gross, all of the county mercantile tax. The collection was accomplished without the institution of legal proceedings.
Burned His Eye
Mr. Samuel Mateer, a moulder at the Grey Iron Works, was severely burned in his eye by molten metal. It was at first thought he would lose the sight of an optic but he is pleased to say that such is not the case.
Still Coming Down
At Columbia potatoes sold at from 30 to 60 cents a bushel and they predict they will drop to 40 cents. The stereotype price in town is 75 cents per.

Agriculture Appropriation Bill
Lancaster county is especially interested in three important provisions of the Agricultural Appropriation bill, which has just been agreed upon by Congress, as Congressman W. W. Griest has succeeded in securing the co-operation of the Agricultural Department in three lines of experimental and farm demonstration work. The bill carries an appropriation to continue the tobacco growing experiments; funds to complete a soil survey and the issuance of a new soil map of Lancaster county, and approximately \$200,000 for the extension of farm demonstration work, of which amount \$50,000 was allowed for use in Pennsylvania and other Northern States as originally urged by Congressman Griest last year.
