Arrangements have been completed with the Pennsylvania Chestnut Tree Blight Commission for the placing of an instructive exhibit at the Lancaster County Fair, October 1, 2, 3, 4.

Specimens showing all stages of this fungus disease of the chestnut tree will be shown, illustrations of its work, methods of treatment, etc. The exhibit will be in charge of a field expert who will give information upon this important subject to all who are interested and explain

the specimens and illustrations. All owners of chestnut trees should be especially interested in this subject, as a knowledge of the blight is essential in determining nce with the provisions of the eight- identification and the condition of

the trees. This desease has already destroyed all of the chestnut trees in Long Island and around New York city. In many cases, the value of the timber was entirely lost. Trees killed by the blight may be utilized, if cut
