## BOY DRAGGED TO DEATH

David Ober, of Mt. Joy Township, Falls From Frightened Mule

David Ober, son of Allen Ober, of Mt. Joy township, near Milton Grove, died on Thursday from injuries received Wednesday. He was at a blacksmith shop, having work done and when he left the shop for his home he rode one mule and led a second. At Green Tree church the mule he was riding scared at something on the road and jumping suddenly, David was thrown off. In his fall he became tangled in the harness. The mule ran for three hundred yards and the young man was "dragged" all this distance. His head came in contact with the rough stones on the road and it was badly cut and bruised. When near his home the harness that held him gave way and he fell to the road. The mule continued in its mad race for a long distance before it was caught.

Young Ober was found on the road by a neighbor and taken home. When the physician was summoned it was found there were many cuts and bruises and that his skull was fractured. He lingered until Thursday morning, when death ensued.

He was 17 years old and worked on his father's farm. He is survived by a brother, Samuel, and a sister Ada.

His funeral was held on Sunday morning with services in the German Baptist Church at Chickies Hill, of which church he was a member.

RAIN AND HAIL

Some Tobacco Ruined—Buildings Struck by Lightning

The fury of that Monday afternoon thunder and hail storm appears to have been concentrated upon a very small area and the damage done is fortunately small, but although it burst right over this section, the terrific force of the wind was only appreciated in a narrow section.

Considerable hail fell in the vicinity of Creswell and Washington Boro, damaging tobacco but just in spots.

Up in Conoy township the wind was very strong, uprooting or else breaking off many trees. This was especially noticeable east of Lobata along the Bainbridge road where many locust trees were blown over.

Lightning struck a tree on the premises of John Dietz, near Ironville, and split it in two. The summer house and barn on the same farm were struck. Mrs. Dietz was stunned by the lightning. When she regained consciousness she saw that the stable was struck and she ran to that building. She found one horse dead and two others affected by the lightning. The latter will recover.
