Automobile Club's Big Meeting

Combining pleasure and business the Lancaster Automobile Club on Friday evening held its regular monthly meeting at the home of ex-Sheriff Aaron B. Landis at Rohrerstown and observed Ladies' Night at the same time. About fifty automobiles arrived at the Landis home and were placed on the three sides of a square, the meeting being held in the middle under the glare of the Automobile searchlight. Tables were spread on the lawn brilliantly illuminated and a splendid supper was served. The more than two hundred and fifty visitors were royally entertained by Mr. Landis and his family.

At the business meeting the feature was the presentation of twelve applications for membership as follows: C. Edgar Titzel, Dr. H. C. Brown, R. L. Gerhart, John H. Steiger, James Shand and W. W. Hollinger, Lancaster; W. C. LeFevre, Manheim; Frank L. Musselman, Strasburg; H. P. Summers, New Holland; H. Galen Fritz and H. H. Gilbert, Quarryville; Park C. Shand, Peters Creek. A report of the special committee appointed to secure a correction of traffic conditions in Lancaster was presented by Dr. J. F. Trexler, showing good work accomplished as a result of interviews with Mayor McClain and the traction company. It was reported that the contractor building the State road from Gap to White Horse has closed the road to travel and a committee was appointed to visit the scene and take action. Solicitor Zimmerman suggested the placing of signs on the approaches to the bridge on the Lititz pike over the P. R. R., asking traffic to take the right side of the bridge, approaching automobiles being unable to see each other until they are on the bridge. Mr. Landis censured

the habit of some motorists in getting as close as they can to a team which has pulled to the side of the road and suggested that the motorist keep his machine as far away from the team as possible.

A pennant bearing the A. A. A. emblem and the words "Lancaster, Pa." was adopted, as the club pennant. It is in the club colors, purple and gold. It having been reported that the State has placed in good condition the road between Lancaster and Quarryville, an invitation to have the September meeting in Quarryville was accepted.

The Second-foot of Water.

"Second-foot," as defined by the United States Geological Survey, is an abbreviation for cubic foot per second and is the unit for the rate of discharge of water flowing in a stream 1 foot wide, 1 foot deep, at a rate of 1 foot per second. It is generally used as a fundamental unit in measurements of stream flow.

"Second-foot per square mile" is the average number of cubic feet of water flowing per second from each square mile of area drained, on the assumption that the run-off is distributed uniformly both as regards time and area.

An "acre-foot" is equivalent to 43,560 cubic feet and is the quantity required to cover an area to a depth of 1 foot. The term is commonly used in connection with storage for irrigation work.

One second-foot flow equals 7.48 United States gallons a second, 448.8 gallons a minute, or 646, 17 gallons a day. As a California "miner's inch" equals 0.187 gallon a second, there are 40 California miner's inches in 1 second-foot.
