Joseph Welby
Mr. Joseph Welby, one of the best known residents of this community, died suddenly and unexpectedly at his home a short distance west of Florin, at seven o'clock (this morning) aged 49 years. He went about his work as usual this morning, and was about to heat a shoe for a horse when he sank to the floor in his shop, dying almost instantly. He was a blacksmith by occupation. Some years ago he conducted a stand in this place, and later the Raymond shop west of Florin until several years ago when he built a shop at his residence where he carried on the business. He leaves a wife and one son, Walter. The funeral will be held from his late home at 9 o'clock on Saturday morning with services at Kraybill's church at 10 o'clock. Interment will be made in the cemetery adjoining.

Mrs. Sophia Miller
Mrs. Sophia Miller, wife of Joseph H. Miller, died at her home at Altoona of a complication of diseases. 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Plunges to Death

FRANK HOLLENBACH, OF MAYTOWN, KILLED

Evidently Walked Out of Bedroom Window, and Fell Eighteen Feet Off of Porch—Lifeless Body Was Found on Pavement—His Skull Fractured.

A fatal accident of an unusual character occurred at an early hour Thursday morning in Maytown, when a very prominent and popular young man of that place lost his life through walking in his sleep. The victim of the accident is Frank Hollenbach, 32 years of age, and a son of David Hollenbach. The family formerly lived in East Donegal township, but some time ago moved to Maytown. The dead man was engaged in the baking business with his brother, Charles, and both lived with their parents. About five o'clock that morning when the people of the town began to stir there was a report that the young man had been killed and the rumor proved only too true. As some one passed the Hollenbach house they saw a man lying on the pavement in his night clothing. Examination showed that it was Mr. Hollenbach. Physicians were sent for, and they found the man's skull was fractured, and they believed he had been dead for several hours.

The deceased was a somnambulist, and was in the habit of walking in his sleep. Upon numerous occasions he had arisen from bed and walked about the house, but never before had it brought him into serious trouble. The supposition is that, while asleep, he walked out of his bedroom window and fell to the porch a few feet below. From the porch he evidently fell to the pavement, eighteen feet. He landed upon his head, and it is thought that death was instantaneous.

The deceased was widely and very favorably known throughout that section on account of his business, and from the fact that he was a favorite socially. He formerly played with the Mt. Joy and Florin base ball clubs.

Besides his parents he is survived by the following brothers: John, of Blue Islands, Illinois; Charles E. and William, of Maytown; Grosh B., of Youngstown, Ohio, and one sister, Mrs. Mary, wife of Howard Stauffer of Landisville, also survives.

The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon at 2.30 from the Reformed church. Interment was made in the Maytown cemetery.
