### Inter-est Session in Village School House Saturday Night

On Saturday evening the Rheems Branch of the Lancaster County Farmers Association met in the Village schoolhouse with a good attendance of members and interested persons.

The meeting was opened with a vocal selection by Miss Alice Barnhart and Miss Margaret Raymond, which was well received. The accompanist was Miss Anna Kreider.

### Will Give Talk Later.

W. J. Rose, of Harrisburg, division freight agent P. R. R., was programmed for talk on "Rail-roads and the Farmer," but he could not be present. He gave promise in a letter that he would speak at a future meeting. Mr. Rose is much interested in the Farmers Association.

### Cause of Unlucky Eggs.

Benjamin Friday gave a brief talk on "What is the Cause of Unlucky Eggs?" He said he did not think the question an important one. It can be answered mainly in one way, the cause being a derangement of the fowl's organs.

### An Interesting Discussion.
