EAST HEMPFIELD S. S.

The Annual Convention To Be Held at Rohrerstown on Saturday

The annual convention of the Sunday Schools of East Hempfield township will be held in the Salem Reformed Church at Rohrerstown, on Saturday, Sept. 14. The afternoon session will begin at 1.30 o'clock and the evening session at 7.30 o'clock. Interesting programs have been arranged, the music in charge of D. H. Gochauer, of East Petersburg. The basement of the church will be open to those who bring their lunch, and coffee will be served, free, by the ladies of Rohrerstown. This will be the eighth annual district convention held in East Hempfield township, and it promises to be one of the most successful gatherings of earnest Sunday School workers ever held in the district. During the afternoon session arguments will be presented for and against the graded lesson system, and Rev. John F. Knittle, of Manheim, will talk on missions. At the evening session Rev. S. C. Enck of Columbia, will entertain with a talk on his trip to the Holy Land.

Must Have Permit to Plant Poles.

Telephone, telegraph, electric light and trolley poles will hereafter be under regulation of the State High way department. Under the law the High way Commissioner who has completed authority over established routes may order changes in poles, and be removed in future not a pole can be planted along a main high way or a conduit laid without permit, which will be granted under conditions suitable to the locality where the work is to be done. All of the permits will be issued from Harrisburg, and the State will reserve the right to have poles removed when public interest requires. In many respects the State's control of poles and underground work will be more extensive than is the supervision exercised by many cities.

Family Theatre

Many people wonder why the Family Theatre can give a bill of seven big acts for the small prices of admission charged, 5 and 10 cents at the matinees and 10, 20 and 30 cents in the evening. The reason for this is simple. The White Rats of America, a corporation made up of theatrical people, own the theatre and when performers come to the Family they work for themselves, and consequently, they work at low salaries. Then, too, the taxes on the Family Theatre are not high owing to its location on West King St., and, everything considered, the patrons of the place are given the benefit of every circumstance. The show this week is a good one but that of next week is promised to be even better.

Senator Bourne, chairman of the Senate committee on postoffices, has been almost inundated with inquiries about the details of the proposed law, which will become effective on January 1 next. He made his response in a general circular letter in which he gives this official summary of the extract effect of the new law.

Flat rate 1c per ounce up and \$1.32. The postmaster general may make provision for indemnity insurance and collection on delivery, with additional charges for such service, and may, with the consent of the inter-state commerce commission after investigation, modify rates, weights and zone distances, when experience has demonstrated the needs thereof.
