POLITICAL TIDE TURNING

Reports From All Parts of the Country Show Republican Prospects Growing Brighter Every Day

The tide has turned. The Republican ticket is coming into its own. The novelty of the third term movement has worn off, and, as was expected, the political pedagogue chosen at Baltimore has failed to meet the expectations of his own party or of independent voters. This is, the conclusion drawn from the reports from all sections of the country during the last few days.

Not alone do the national headquarters at New York and Chicago report a radical change in popular sentiment, but State chairmen and local observers, writing from all parts of the country confirm the assertions.

From the headquarters in New York Chairman Hillis reports many highly favorable indications. From Chicago come like reports from National Committeeman Mulvane and Representative Diekema. From Washington National Committeeman Perkins telegraphs in the most encouraging tone, and from Los Angeles it is learned that the conduct of the Third Term party in the recent local election there was such as to disgust and alienate many who had purposed to support Roosevelt and Johnson, marked ballots being employed at most of the polling places.

The Maine and Vermont elections have served at once to demonstrate the hopelessness of a victory for the Third Term party and to prove that the expected Democratic landslide will not materialize this year.

Republican managers have all along been confident that the tide would turn, and that on November 4 it would be running strongly in the direction of President Taft. It is for that reason that they are especially gratified and encouraged that 13,000 votes should have been overturned in Maine by the date set for the turning of the tide. And they believe that both Vermont and Maine have shown conclusively how hollow is the claim that the country is certain to go Democratic in the coming election.

The repudiation by Governor-elect Haines of Theodore Roosevelt has proved already a body blow to the aspirant for a third term.

The pitiful showing of the third termers in the recent Michigan primaries has been followed by the repudiation of Mr. Roosevelt.

So, too, the third term aspirant has received a crushing blow from his closest and most intimate friend Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts, who will open the president's campaign in Ohio. All who know Mr. Lodge and appreciate his great personal affection for Mr. Roosevelt realize that nothing short of the conviction that it was his solemn duty to take this step would have led him to desert his old friend and especially to take the stump against him. The effect of his course is bound to be far reaching.

From various sections come indications of the resentment of both the Germans and the advocates of universal peace over Colonel Roosevelt's reckless and extravagant denunciation of Representative Bartholdt, whom Mr. Roosevelt has characterized as a pickpocket, a liar, and a cutthroat because the representative dared to challenge any corner to a joint debate. Mr. Bartholdt took the ground that the nomination of President Taft at Chicago was perfectly just and proper and that Col. Roosevelt's denunciation of the national committee and the national convention was slanderous and wholly without foundation in fact. As one of the leaders in the movement for universal peace, Mr. Bartholdt has a host of admirers far beyond the confines of his own State, and they, as well as his many German supporters, are indignant at the vituperative denunciation by Roosevelt.

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORKERS

Three Persons in This County in Active Service Over 50 Years

The executive committee of the Lancaster County School Association met in Lancaster, Tuesday afternoon, Rev. S. C. Enck, the president, presiding.

It was learned that there are three persons in this county who have been active in Sunday School work as a teacher or officer for over fifty years. They are Roland S. Brubaker of Trinity Lutheran Sunday School at New Holland; D. S. Enck of Ephrata, and Miss Mary Lytle, of Smyrna. The State Sabbath School Association will award a medal to one of them, or perhaps all of them, Mr. Brubaker being recommended for first honor.

The State convention will be held in Philadelphia Oct. 8 to 11. The county is entitled to send thirty delegates. The president was authorized to appoint four delegates, he to be one of them. All other Sunday School workers in this county who desire to attend the convention in Philadelphia as delegates should write to Miss Mary E. Swope, 352 W. Orange street, Lancaster, to secure their appointment and receive credentials. They will be issued in the order received.

The cradle roll and home departments, Miss Mary Wallace and Miss Alice Strickler, superintendents, respectively, have qualified for the county front line position, and efforts will be made to have the teacher training department in front line position also.

It was voted to pledge \$100 to the State work for the ensuing year, and to contribute \$5 toward the expenses of sending W. G. Landes, of Philadelphia, to the International Sunday School convention in Zurich.

This county will hold its convention in Lancaster Thursday, Oct. 17. A good-sized booklet will be issued for the occasion which will contain a history of Sunday school work in this county, statistics and other valuable information.
