Death resulted from paralysis. He was aged 69 years and 6 days. Dr. Breneman was born and raised in this community. He practiced as a veterinarian for over forty years, enjoying a very large practice. Deceased was a member of the Mennonite church. He leaves a wife and three daughters: Mrs. Dr. E. W. Newcomer of this place; Mrs. Herr of Keady's; and Miss Martha at home. One sister and two brothers also survive. The funeral will be held from his late home on Friday afternoon with services in the Mennonite Church on West Donegal street at 1.30 o'clock. Interment will be made at Erisman's.

 VERDICT IS DIRECTED
 Jury Awards Winfield Scott Heisey All Insurance Money
 The first case taken up at Court on Monday was that of W. L. Heisey against the Lawn Mutual Fire, Storm and Lightning Company, of Lawn. Plaintiff carried two policies for \$4,250 and \$2,000 on properties at Rheims. On August 15, 1911, his barn and contents were burned and he applied to the company for payment of his loss. It was not paid and the amount, \$4,000, with interest is \$4,195.83. This he sued to recover.
 The defense was that in November, 1910, the company had laid assessments on Heisey's policies. The assessments were not paid and the policies were suspended.
 By direction of court the jury found in favor of the plaintiff for the full amount, \$4,195.83. A rule was granted to allow the case to come up in argument court.
 Too Bad, Ephraim
 When Ephraim Ebersole, living about three miles above Bainbridge, went to his spring house on Thursday morning to get 40 pounds of butter which he intended to deliver to his customers in Marietta, he found that during the night some sneak thief had taken it, besides everything else that was in the spring house. Mr. Ebersole was kept busy explaining to his customers the reason why he could not serve them.
 The Garb Question
 President Taft has decided that teachers now employed in Indian schools may continue to wear the garb of their religious orders, but the privilege is denied any person hereafter entering the service.
 This will be of interest in this section, the garb question having been recently thoroughly aired thru the county courts and according to the above the opinions of Judge Landis and President Taft coincide.
 Improvements
 The New Standard Hardware Works have erected a new stack to their tinning house. The company are making various improvements in their tinning house, increasing their capacity for tinning from 50,000 pounds to 100,000 pounds per month.
