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(MT. JOY BOYS WIN MEDALS)

County Athletic Meet Great Success, Almost Five Hundred County Boys Participating

Yesterday was a big day for the boys of Lancaster County and one of the most profitable days ever spent by the Lancaster County boys at the Lancaster Fair. It was the general occasion for the First Annual County Athletic Meet and the first athletic meet of its kind ever held at any of the fairs in the middle states. The meet was conducted under the auspices of the Lancaster County Young Men's Christian Association, of which Mr. Jame A. Boehm, recently transferred from Massachusetts to this county, is the secretary. The boys' day was started by a street parade of a few hundred boys from all parts of the county headed by the Manheim Cornet Band. The officials were in charge of Mr. William Raub with thirty two officials under him, many of whom were principals of the county schools.

Great interest had been stirred up all over the county in the meet of this day. For the first time about all of the county schools. It is reasonably supposed that the attendance of school children was again as large as the attendance last year, the reason being the interest shown by the schools all over the county in the athletic meet. All over the Fair grounds could be seen groups of High School boys and girls with their pennants, singing and cheering for their athletes. The grand stand was filled with enthusiastic followers of the athletes. By the time that the morning events were run off, it was a general consensus of opinion that the meet was surely a great success and that the meet should be made an annual affair and, if possible, the whole day given over to the meet of county boys, as nothing has ever created the interest in the first day of the Fair as did this successful County Athletic meet.

By no means did the city boys out run, or out jump the country boys in many events, the county boys, for the first time on the track, held their own with the more experienced city boys, and among the winners were many surprises. The time made in all the events was good. The races creating the most interest were the relay races, Landisville winning first place in the Township High School race by running the mile in 4 minutes and 16 seconds, while the first place in the Borough High School Relay Race went to Ephrata High School, Mercury A. A., the new Athletic Association of Lancaster City, won first place in the Invitation One Mile Relay, with Quarryville following in the second place. The county and Grammar School Relays were both very interesting, first place in the county race being won by Columbia and first place in the city race by Mulberry Grammar school.

Mt. Joy boys were well pleased with the result of the meet. A great deal of enthusiasm was stirred up in the town and a relay team representing the town, with a number of other athletes, under the direction of our popular young physician, Dr. Snyder, who had taken a great interest in this work, and Prof. Roundbush, went to the Lancaster Fair rather determined to return with some of the medals. One of the sensations of the whole meet came when Elmer Jackson came within an inch of winning the 100 yard dash, the first event of the day. By the time the meet was over, Elmer had gathered together a silver medal for second place in the 100 yard dash, a bronze medal for third place in the running broad jump and another silver medal for second place in the high jump. Musser Stauffer also won a silver medal by winning second place in the potato race as did also William Ellis by winning third place in the One mile run. While the town relay team did not finish among the three first teams, they nevertheless feel well pleased in having beaten out their rivals Elizabethtown. One thing is sure, and that is that Mt. Joy will go to the Athletic meet next year with more athletes than this year and also hope to again return with a number of medals.
