SERVICES IN MOUNT JOY

Boys' Day Will Be fittingly Observed in Lancaster County

Sunday, Oct. 13, will be known as Boys' Day in Lancaster County. On this day Mr. James A. Boehm, secretary of the Lancaster County Young Men's Christian Association and Sept. of the Young People's division of the Sunday Schools of the county, has arranged to have fifteen men, most of them directors of Young People's work, emphasize work for boys in about thirty churches in Lancaster County. Most of the men who will speak at these services on Sunday are secretaries of the Young Men's Christian Associations in New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania. It is the aim of the Association on this day to arouse more interest among the fathers and mothers and people in general in Lancaster County in the great Boy Problem, this being a great problem when it is known that twenty six thousand young men under twenty one years of age are living in Lancaster County out side of the city. Mr. Carruthers, State Secretary of Young Men's Christian Association work of Pennsylvania, will be the speaker at the Presbyterian Church in the morning. Mr. Carruthers is a strong speaker and will have an interesting message for the fathers and mothers and young people of Mt. Joy. In the evening Mr. W. J. Campbell, Secretary of Rural and Village work in this state, will speak at the United Brethren Church. No one should fail to hear Mr. Campbell's message which will be an interesting one taken from the many experiences that Mr. Campbell has had in young people's work. Mr. Henry Israel, of New York City, at a union service in Lititz in the evening. Mr. O. T. Read, of New Jersey, at Rohrerstown in the morning and Landisville in the evening. It is hoped that these services will be a means of creating more interest in boys' work all over the county.
