Some Well Known People From Our Neighborhood Have Passed to the Great Beyond Since Our Last Issue. Gone to Their Reward.

Captain Andrew H. Hershey died at Sterling, Ill., aged 72 years. He formerly lived at Marietta.

John A. Ebersole

John A. Ebersole, a former resident of near Maytown, died at Deltville, Perry County aged 57 years. He was confined to his bed the past four and a half years with rheumatism.

The seven year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Smelter died at Lancaster last week after a brief illness. The remains were brought here Monday at ten o'clock, and funeral services were held in the United Brethren Church. Interment was made in the Eberle Cemetery.

William H. Nevin

William H. Nevin, who moved here from Marietta, died at his home on Monday, aged 28 years. He was employed at the Grey Iron. Besides his wife, two children survive. His mother, living at McCall's Ferry, also survives. The funeral will be held from his late home on Thursday at 9:30, after which the remains will be taken to Marietta for interment.

Percy Abel
