music. Mr. C. N. Mumma was
chairman of the meeting and Dr.
E. W. Garber secretary. The meet-
ing opened with prayer by Rev.
Spangler followed by singing.
Prof. A. B. Hiestler, W. M. Harnish,
Esq., Dr. W. F. Kline, John W.
Hetrick Esq. and Frank H. Lehman
made able addresses. The hall was
packed and the audience very
attentive.

On Saturday evening the Re-
publicans held a mass meeting and
rally in Mt. Joy Hall. Dr. W. R.
Heilig presided. An excellent ad-
dress covering the political situa-
tion in an exhaustive manner, was
delivered by Wm. H. Keller, Esq.
of Lancaster. Mr. J. Andrew
Frantz spoke on behalf of the Leag-
ue of First Presidential votes. The
local committee were disappointed
the speakers engaged for the
meeting did not put in appearance.
The audience, while fair, was not
what it should have been. The For-
esters Band furnished music for the
occasion.

East Hempfield got into the pro-
cession and the assemblage that
gathered on Saturday evening at the
Sycamore Hotel indicates that the
Landisville section of the district is
strong for the Republican ticket. The
voters were addressed by J. Edgar
Sherts, C. N. Berntheizer and B. C.
Alee Esqs. The meeting had been
arranged by the League of First Presi-
dential Voters. The organization
was as follows: President, A. M.
Eshleman; Vice Presidents, Roy
Hershey, Elam Nissley, Walter Gray
Miller Eshleman, Arthur Mease;
Secretaries, Henry Miller and Walter
Herr.

Must Return Stocks
Henry Waring was called for
sentence for false pretense at Court
on Saturday. He had been convict-

York. In handling the deal for the
sale of the securities, Waring, a

the ground of his illness. He was
sentenced to six months' imprison-
ment and fined \$50 and ordered to
restore the stock belonging to the

Paid Fine and Costs
Dr. C. J. Marshall, State Veteri-
narian, received word that W. E.
Jones, a cattle dealer at Spriggs,
Greene County, had plead guilty to
the charge brought by the State
Livestock Sanitary Board of bring-
ing dairy cows into Pennsylvania
from West Virginia without a
health certificate or official permit
as is required by law. Mr. Jones
paid the fine and costs.

The Livestock Sanitary Board
officials state they are determined
that the interstate law must be
complied with and the herds of in-
nocent Pennsylvania dairymen and
breeders protected against diseased
cattle from other States.
