The Week in Grain

Phila, Pa., October 28, 1912. There has been good action early and late, with foreign developments serving largely as influences. The withdrawal of two important ship lines from the Black Sea gave more weight to rumors forecasting a probable closing of the Dardanelles, at the same time creating the possibility of an enlarged tonnage from American ports reducing freight rates and stimulating grain sales to Europe. Continental markets witnessed several sessions of excited advances, with various rumors more or less grave in character affixed, but for the most part lacking confirmation. At the same time, however, there are better demand for cash grain for export, and with an increase in speculative buying, price swings have shown a disposition to enlarge, with a decided upward trend. Western advices continue to be rather pessimistic of sustained advances at this time, unless European conditions should reach a more acute stage. Movement of Wheat to primaries continue heavy, and the cash trade at best can be considered nothing better than slow. This feature seems less influential speculatively at the moment, than others normally less important, for the reason that huge receipts have been, the feature ever since harvest, without creating burdensome stocks at any center. Mean while clearances during the same period are much less in excess of normal, with European advices sufficiently grave to suggest that the necessities from that source will enlarge rather than decrease. It is a good trading market, where sudden price swings are likely to be followed by reversals, and rumors be as easily allayed as they are created.

Why He Should be Re-Elected
A brief resume of the activities and actual accomplishments of Hon. W. W. Griest, since he has been in Congress, is every reason why he should be returned. A brief review is appended. Mr. Griest has been especially successful in his efforts to help the farmers and advance agricultural interests of the country. He was successful in his efforts for protection on tobacco and cigars, tobacco experiments, bulletins on tobacco, soil survey, farmers' bulletins, better roads, farm demonstration and experiments, topographic survey, etc. Thru his efforts over 70,000 brook trout, 17,000 bass and 600,000 pike perch fry were distributed in the streams of this country. In 1911 every post office in the county was supplied with a map of the United States for post offices. Also succeeded in securing an increase in the indemnity allowance for the families of railway postal employees. Is procuring mail delivery services for thirteen towns in the county, is making a great fight for penny postage. Other public matters that he has been greatly interested in are free smokers, butter vs. oleomargarine, pensions, public welfare legislation, public buildings, claims bills, etc.

When Mr. Griest first became a candidate for Congress he made no campaign promises; he has made none since; and he is making none now. With indefatigable industry on behalf of his constituents, and with a well-tested capacity for achieving results, he has advocated whatever seemed to be for the best interests of all the people of Lancaster county and the State of Pennsylvania.
