Rheems Farmers

INTERESTING SESSION HELD IN THE VILLAGE SCHOOL HOUSE

Talks Were Instructive—Audience Enlightened on Subjects Relating to Transportation, Irrigation and Preparation of Tobacco Beds. Other Notes

The Rheems Branch of the Lancaster County Farmers' Association held its monthly meeting on Saturday night in the village school house. There was an encouraging attendance.

Following the transaction of miscellaneous business there was a vocal solo by Christ Martin of Elizabethtown, with Miss Della Shenk as accompanist.

"Agricultural Traffic."

Owing to his inability to be present, Superintendent W. B. McCaleb, of the P. R. R. Company, wrote an explanatory letter, in which he promised to speak at a later meeting. In his place Nelson Hoffman, of Harrisburg, supervising agent of the P. R. R. Company, gave a talk. He first called attention to the marvelous increase in farm values and what must be done to maintain this condition. Cooperation, he said, was a main factor in keeping up farm values. The work which falls on the railroad companies was outlined. The importance of agriculture was dwelt upon at length. It was asserted that this Thanksgiving will be a great one for the farmer, despite the presidential election and what stump speakers say of the farmers' lot. The luxury of the past is the present day necessity. There must be a means of transporting farm commodities and the railroad stands first. Mr. Hoffman told at length of the importance of the railroad in times of war and peace. The railroad has also increased property values and has been the means of the building of good roads. It is cooperating with the home, the church and the school for the up lifting of mankind. The railroad company, the speaker said, aids to suppress intemperance, vice, etc. The speaker dwelt on the conditions existing a century ago and compared them with those of the present day. The powers of the United States were outlined in a very entertaining manner by Mr. Hoffman. He said that railroads are "beast of burden" for the farmer and a plea was made that the railroad be given fair treatment. The speaker said that foolish interference by legislation means much against the P. R. R. Company. It usually means a raise in price to the shipper. He said the 6 per cent dividends paid by the P. R. R. Company are not unreasonable.

In conclusion, the speaker said that from Nov. 15 to Dec. 2 there will be a national show of land products at Madison Square Garden, N. Y. The desire is to have this State well represented and the speaker pleaded that Lancaster Co. farmers send articles to the show.

Talk by H. H. Snively

H. H. Snively, of Willow Street, had been programmed for a talk on "Would It Be Profitable for Lancaster Co. to Establish an Irrigation Plant?" The speaker questioned whether the subject meant that there should be a plant paid for by the county or individual plants. He said that soil, light and moisture are the three great necessities for the growth of farm products. He told of the benefits of irrigation plants in Florida. Tobacco, alfalfa and celery may be benefited by irrigation. Mr. Snively said that it would be necessary to draw water from the streams for an irrigation plant and this will cause trouble. It may pay sometimes to have an irrigation plant on the farm and at other times it would prove expensive. Very much depends on conditions. Meadows are irrigated and frequently the overflow of the watering trough is used for irrigation purposes.

Tobacco Field Preparation

P. S. Kraybill opened a discussion of "How Would You Prepare a Tobacco Field in the Fall?" He said that each farmer may have his own way, but he believed the beds should be taken care of during the summer to derive benefit from them. The speaker uses barnyard manure, spaded in, which is allowed to lay over the winter. After the frost the bed settles and it is far better. Mr. Kraybill knew of a man who applies manure and plows his beds. Toward spring, in January, or February, he applies cottonseed meal. At seed time he thoroughly rakes and loosens the ground. He has no bother whatever. Manure is used and sprinkling is done thru it.

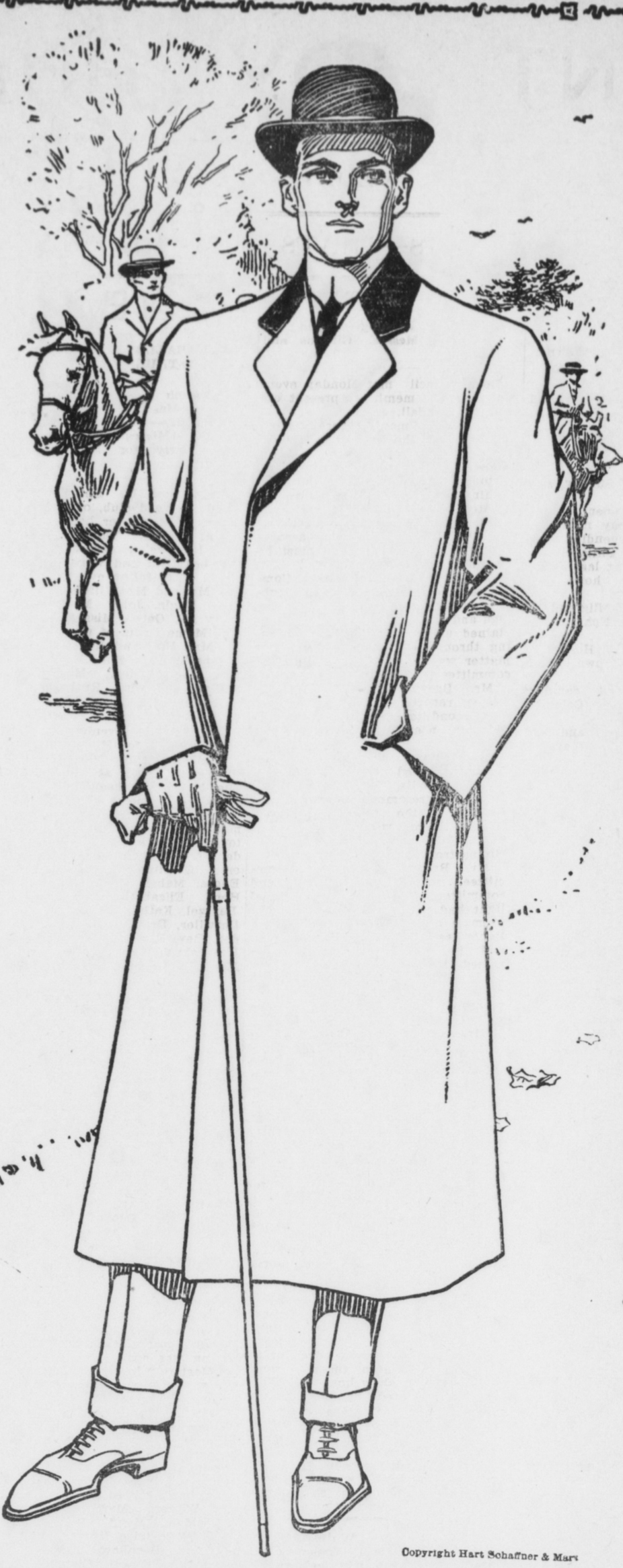

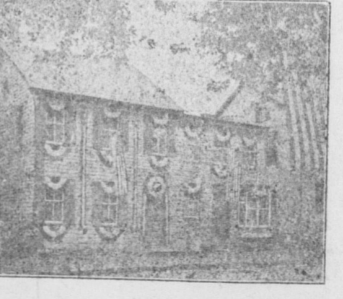
