SUIT WITHOUT COUNSEL

W. L. Halsey Files Statement He Prepared for Damages

Thursday an action of a rare nature was stated in common pleas court when W. L. Halsey, of Rheems, sued several persons to recover \$60,000. He prepared his statement and filed it himself without an attorney. The defendants in the suit are: Royer S. Bush, J. Harvey Buch, B. F. Hoffman, N. R. Hoffman, M. R. Hoffman, John W. Eshleman, S. R. Zimmerman, esq. and Isaac R. Herr, esq.

In the statement it is alleged that the defendants are in a conspiracy to deprive him of his property, near Rheems and the equities in the same that among his real estate are valuable quarries; that on February 12, 1912 he made an assignment for the benefit of creditors to John W. Eshleman and M. R. Hoffman and that they are in the conspiracy with the other defendants to defraud him. He gives as one instance of the loss he is sustaining that his quarries which netted him \$7,000 a year have not been operated since the assignment.

Mr. Halsey sues for \$40,000 damages to himself, \$10,000 damages for his wife and \$10,000 damages for his aged parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jacob W. Halsey.
A suitor is not bound to have an attorney to start proceedings and he may even conduct the trial of his case.

James R. Nagle, a former resident of Marietta, died in Los Angeles, Cal. He was a son of the late S. S. and Elizabeth Malone Nagle. The funeral was held on Tuesday morning with services in St. Mary's church, Lancaster.

Ellen Boyer

Ellen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Boyer, died early Friday morning at the home of her parents on West Donegal street, after a short illness from pneumonia, aged 1 year and 11 months. Her parents and a brother and a sister survive. The funeral was held on Sunday morning at 9 o'clock at the house and at 10 o'clock at the Florin United Brethren Church. Interment was made in the Florin cemetery.

Martin N. Musser

The deceased was born in Marietta February 2, 1832. He was a son of the late Jacob and Anna Libhart, was born in Marietta and lived there his entire life. In early manhood he learned the trade of a cabinetmaker with his father and was a skilled mechanic. He erected the first pipe organ in Lancaster county. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church. November 1867 he was married to Miss Kate Colic, who survives with two daughters Miss Harriet and Miss Anna M. Libhart. Last Tuesday was the forty fifth anniversary of the wedding of Mr. and Mrs. Libhart. The funeral will be held on Thursday afternoon at two o'clock with services at his late home.
