Farmers Column

USEFUL INFORMATION FOR THE
FARMER

At Last a Stingless Bee That Will
Gather Honey—An Electric In-
sect Extinguisher on Market—
How to Kill Wire Grass—Other
Notes.

The ordinary farmer will gain by
stacking his grain.

The clover should be cut as soon
as it is in blossom.

Deep-plowed land has a great ca-
pacity for storage of moisture.

A heavy crop of weeds will check
the growth of the clover a great
deal.

The grain binder is the most
satisfactory implement for cutting
timothy seed.

Sow some clover; if nowhere else
sow in corn after the cultivation is
over.

The most important factor in
soil improvement is growing
leguminous crops.

The easiest way to eradicate weeds
on the farm is to prevent their
going to seed.

Silage made of corn and soy
beans is more digestible than made
from corn silage alone.

One of the qualities of the soy
bean that commends it to the stock
feeder is its protein richness.

Much of the feeding value of the
clover depends upon how the crop
is managed after it is cut.

The best stock pea for grazing in
the fields is black. Everlasting,
Red and Red Ripper are also good.

The silo means excellent feed
stored in small space. Just what is
needed when the grass in the pas-
ture is dry.

Protein that is grown upon the
farm is often more palatable than
that which is purchased in concen-
trated form and it is also cheaper.

The so called wire grasses are
many such grasses as propagate by
means of creeping root stalks con-
stantly reproduce new plants at the
rooting points, as couch or quack
grass, Johnson grass, Bermuda
grass and members of the blue
grass family. This pasture, if
adapted to tillage, should be com-
pletely pulverized to the depth of
four inches with a cutaway or disk
harrow in July and kept harrowed
once a week so long as the soil re-
mains dry during the remainder of
the season, allowing no green spear
of grass to get a foothold. By fall
the mass of roots will be practically
lifeless if the season has been nor-
mally dry and hot. The whole
should then be turned under ten
inches deep, using a jointer. In the
spring, harrow every week until
time to plant a cultivated crop,
then keep perfectly clean and the
battle will be won.

The disease carrying fly, the mos-
quito and the gnat are disturbers
of human comfort, while coddling
moths and similar pests infest or-
chards and gardens. Various means
of exterminating these insects are
sought and tried out. That elec-
tricity may step in as a benefactor
in this field is quite possible, for
successful tests with various devices
are pointing the way. An electric
insect exterminator just placed on
the market is simple in principle,
consisting for out door use of an in-
sulating cylinder upon which fine
wires are strung so close together
that insects on alighting upon them
will come in contact with at least
two charged wires. To attract in-
sects at night a light is placed with
in the cylinder. Moths and other
insects fly against the netting, com-
plete the electric circuit and drop
dead. The wires are charged from
an induction coil operated from a
six volt battery.

The stingless bee is on the job of
honey making in undress parade if
we are to credit the statement of
one Burroughs, bee breeding
specialist of England. Two years
of cross breeding Cyurian drones
(gentlemen bees of leisure) with
Italian queens (female bees of
quality) has resulted in stingless,
not stingerless workers. The sting-
ing organ is still in the bee's scab-
bard, so to speak, but it cannot be
unlimbered (to mix the figure).
The claim is made that these un-
armed bees are more vigorous than
the ones arrayed for battle, the
vitalized fighting blood being divert-
ed to business equipment. The
sterilizing strength of the unused
poison gland seems also to have im-
mured this coming bee against
disease. This breeding experiment
may not prove to have given the
world a race of bees that will per-
petuate a harmless honey gathering
insect, but, if not such a bee will
be bred later. Mankind likes not to be
stung. Therefore the sting must go.

IN ANCIENT EGYPT

Body of Pharaoh Still Visible in
Old Tomb.

Country Always Irredeemably Moham-
medan—The Tourist is Awakened
at Dawn by the Muzzein Call-
ing All to Prayer.

Cairo, Egypt.—The old, old Egypt—
the Egypt of the Pyramids, the Sphinx
and the temples of the Upper Nile.
One can never forget it, though no
one can fully describe the sensations
it arouses. It is, indeed, impossible
to paint with a pen the sapphire blue
of the sky, that interlude of color be-
tween the golden glow of the African
sunset and the Egyptian darkness. As
I walked about through the broken
columns of Karnak and saw still guard-
ing the doorways the statues of kings
in the Temple of Luxor carved 1,500
years before Christ—as I groped down
the long stairways into the tomb of
Amhenotep III. where the body of the
ancient Pharaoh, still visible, has lain
fore more than 30 centuries; or stand-
ing under the bright tropical sun upon
the towers of the Temple of Denderah,
beautiful in the memory of the Egypt-
ian Goddess of Joy and Love, one
looks far across desert sands to the
Nile, flowing through old, hushed
Egypt, as Leigh Hunt says:

"Like some great mighty thought
treading a dream."

But the impression, also difficult to
analyze or interpret, which the west-
ern traveler and student receives be-
fore many hours in Alexandria or
Cairo, is the fact that he has reached
the land of the Moslem. In Egypt, Is-
lam is the great ever-present reality.
It faces one in the field as well as in
the mosque, in Egypt's laws as in
her social customs, in her homes and
in her schools. Egypt has often
changed her conquerors; indeed, she
has through generations been virtually
a subject race. But since the Arabs
crossed to Egypt in the seventh cen-
tury the land has been irredeemably
Mohammedan. On my first morning of
residence in Cairo I was awakened at
daybreak by a muzzelin in the minaret
of a mosque near by, chanting in
that voice that is half a song and half
a wall the Mohammedan call to
prayer.

This call is answered not by a few
people in one particular social strata
of life, but by a whole nation. I have
seen a mosque full of students and
stately sheikhs leave their books for
these daily summons to prayer, which
if they are true Moslems they obey
five times each day. I have seen the

Phila., Pa., Nov. 18, 1912.

The end of the week witnessed
the lowest prices for the move-
ment the greatest influence being
the foreign situation. Deprived of
what promised to be a prolonged
struggle between the Balkan states
and Turkey domestic conditions
became more of a factor. Those
were constantly increasing receipts
slackening cash demand and belief
that with the close of navigation
stocks will show decided accumula-
tion. The news from Argentine has
tended to influence other exporting
countries. With the cessation of
the foreign war all European coun-
tries will sell more freely and this,
too, has worked against our grain.

Sentiment showed no change from
the pronounced bearishness into
it has drifted and with an active
campaign against prices still lower
levels are predicted.

Corn was also under the weight
of liquidation, all contributing
factors being in favor of the maturity
of the crop. Weather conditions
have contributed to further im-
provement in the quality and while
the export demand has shown some
improvement farmers have been
free sellers. At times speculative
buying has been good, but the ten-
dency has been toward lower
prices. It too closes at about the
lowest for the movement.

While predictions were for lower
prices in oats its decline was less
proportionately than all the other
grains, and toward the end of the
week withstood the influence of
weakness in the other grains. Ex-
port demand fair, but the size of
the crop against bullish enthusiasm.
