The Kansas Farmer hits the nail on the head when it declares that "the man who gets along without work is making somebody's back ache."

"Agriculture is being taught in the schools of Indiana," states Indiana farmer. But it would be interesting to know more in detail just what passes for agricultural teaching in those schools.

An Indiana reader asks me what I think of the plan of sowing onion seed in the fall to be ready for starting in spring. Not much do I think of it for our northern sections. It may work all right sometimes, but will usually fail.

The Week in Grain

Phila. Pa., Dec. 24 1912 The final estimate of the Department of Agriculture, showing wheat yield in excess of 730 million and more than 3100 1400 million, respectively, of Corn and Oats, established new high records in American production.

Clearances for the week of six million Wheat, again direct the attention of the trade to the activity that has prevailed all season in export lines. The indications are that when the statistics are available, wheat exports since July 1st, to the years end will approximate 75 million. Primary receipts for the same period should total between 250 and 255 million, against a record of 253 million, and a normal interior movement of 230 million. This is naturally at the expense of farmers holding, and while stocks have accumulated to a rather burdensome total, our export trade has relieved to a material degree, and it is a fair assumption that normal domestic requirements should care for arrivals at primary points for the remainder of the season.
