Some Well Known People From Our Neighborhood Have Passed to the Great Beyond Since Our Last Issue. Gone to Their Reward. Adam Maxton died at Columbia, aged 88 years. George Sheetz of Columbia is dead, aged 70 years. Mrs. Elizabeth Meisenhelder died at Columbia aged 92 years. Mrs. Wm. F. Kame, a former resident of Marietta, died at Berkeley, Cal., aged 62 years. Mrs. William Alberne, a former resident of Columbia, died at Germantown aged 62 years. Frank Portner died at the home of his parents in Marietta from tuberculosis, in his 34th year.

Abraham R. Swope Abraham R. Swope, of Elizabethtown, landlord of the Black Horse Hotel, that place, died there Wednesday of typhoid pneumonia after a short illness, aged 58 years.

Early Friday morning Elphalet Oram Lyte, A. M. Ph. D., died at the Hamilton Apartments, Lancaster, after a lingering illness. He had been principal of the Millersville State school since 1887 and was one of the most widely known and popular educators in the county.

Ell Foster Ell Foster, an aged resident of West Donegal township, who resided at Running Pump about two miles from Elizabethtown, died on Monday afternoon, from pneumonia after a brief illness. Mr. Foster taught school in the district for twenty years. He lived his entire life in the old homestead and occupied it until his death. He was eighty-three years of age and the father of ten children, all of whom survive, as follows: Harvey of Berryburg, Dauphin county; Eli of Topeka, Kan.; Israel and John, Philadelphia; Sadie of Chicago; Mary of Washington, D. C.; Lizzie, Baltimore; Mrs. Undercoffer, Philadelphia, and Mrs. Framer at home. The funeral was held in Obers' meeting house adjoining the residence with interment in Mt. Ober cemetery.

H. S. Garber Mr. H. S. Garber, a well known and highly esteemed resident of this borough, died at 8:30 o'clock Tuesday morning, Jan. 7, at the age of seventy-five years. Mr. Garber has been living in Mt. Joy since 1870, having moved here from Donegal Springs. He was always interested in the progress of our schools and served in the capacity of School Director for 15 years. Mr. Garber was also interested in industrial affairs, being one of the original incorporators and Directors of the New Standard Hardware Works of this town organized in 1909. He is survived by his wife, Barbara Engle Garber, and the following children: Norman E., Pittsburg, Pa.; Alice wife of John C. Beauty, Phila.; Ellen, at home; Mary, wife of the late G. C. Miller, Mount Joy; Elizabeth E., wife of M. A. Rollman, Mount Joy. Funeral Thursday afternoon at 1:30 at the house. Interment will be made in the Mount Joy cemetery.

Borough Council

Brief Session Held in The Council Chamber Monday Night Mount Joy Borough Council met on Monday evening with Messrs. B. S. Dillinger, Wm. Tyndall, C. N. Mumma and E. M. Barto present. Also Burgess Hoffman. Mr. Tyndall occupied the presidential chair in the absence of Mr. Brown. The report of the Burgess showed collections to the amount of \$151 the past Councilmanic month. The representatives of the Water, Finance, Property and Light Committees reported everything O. K. It was suggested that the locks as well as the doors at the post office be repaired. So ordered. Mr. Dillinger of the Special Committee, reported that the advertising in regards to the special election was due as per instructions from the solicitor. Burgess Hoffman stated that he had instructed the Judges of Election in both wards to get all information in reference to holding the special election. A bill for \$19 to reimburse Friendship Fire Company for gasoline purchased, brought forth some discussion. The bill was paid but Council is of the opinion that the Fire Co. should pay these bills and ask for an appropriation whenever its funds are low. Burgess Hoffman hit the nail on the head when he made mention of a few facts. In part he said: Last year Borough Council gave the Fire Co. \$18.65. That is quite a sum of money to do business with for a whole year, buy gasoline, keep up repairs, etc., to the apparatus. Of course the appropriation of Council called for \$50 but \$31.35 of that amount, the Burgess said, was received from the state as foreign fire insurance money and belongs to the fire company. Council, agreed to the man, that the Fire Company should pay all its bills and ask for an appropriation whenever it needs it, if it is several times a year. Heretofore Hoffman the Fire Company only asked for it once a year. Mr. Hoffer of the Board of Health, reported but one case of measles in the town and that one was only reported the day previous. His annual report to Council is appended: To the Burgess and Members of Council: The year 1912 was marked so far as the vital statistics of the Borough is concerned by unusual conditions. There were more cases of contagious disease than at any previous time in the history of the borough since the organization of the Board of Health. Most of the cases resulting therefrom, yet the death rate is almost twice that of the birth rate, this being due primarily to an unusually low birth rate and to the deaths of aged persons. There were 133 cases of measles from which one death resulted; 10 cases of diphtheria from which one death resulted; 12 cases of chicken pox; 3 of mumps.
