INTERESTING SESSION IN VILLAGE SCHOOLHOUSE SATURDAY NIGHT

One Minute Talks Given After Dr. R. C. Gross Spoke on "Horse Breeding" Members of Audience Gave Views on Varied and Timely Subjects

On Saturday evening a meeting of the Rheems Farmers was held in the village schoolhouse, which was prettily decorated in keeping with the season. There was a good attendance of members and interested persons. W. L. Helsey presided in the absence of B. F. Garber.

Talk on Horse Breeding
Dr. R. C. Gross, of Elizabethtown, gave a talk on "Horse Breeding." He said that there must be a right start if success is to be expected. The object to be attained must first be selected. Horses were divided into three classes, draft, coach and road. The latter are not in demand because of the condition of roads. The coach horse is the most beneficial for the farmer. Draft horses are selected when animals are desired for selling purposes. A number of coach horses will be shown. TO THE QUALIFIED VOTERS OF MOUNT JOY BOROUGH

There will be an election held on
Tuesday, Feb. 18, 1912
between the hours of 7 o'clock A. M. and 7 o'clock P. M., at the usual and regular voting places in said Borough of Mount Joy, for the purpose of submitting the question of a loan of Forty-Two Thousand Dollars (\$42,000) to the electors of said Borough, the proceeds of said loan to be applied and appropriated as follows: Twenty-Seven Thousand Dollars (\$27,000) thereof to the refunding of the outstanding bonds issued under the four per cent loan of September 1, 1880, falling due September 1, 1912, and Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary for the erection and installation of a filter plant in connection with the water system of said Borough, in pursuance to a resolution passed by the Council of Mount Joy Borough December 2, 1911.

The amount of the last assessed valuation of taxable property in the Borough of Mount Joy is \$823,040.
The amount of the existing indebtedness is \$27,000.
