Farmers Column

USEFUL INFORMATION FOR THE FARMER

The Raising of Pure Bred Stock—The Purchase of Impure Seeds—Lettuce in Winter Time—Pruning Trees and Vines—Better Farming.

It's shocking the number of farmers who will excavate corn shocks from the snowdrifts each winter, but not so shocking as formerly. Silos and shredders have reduced the number.

A neglected asparagus bed on the place is little commercial value, and to take up the old crowns and reset them would be unwise when young plants can be obtained at a moderate cost and a new bed planted at much less expense.

Save all of the wood ashes and apply them to the orchard. They supply potash, which is a necessary element of fertility. In addition to the plant food value of ashes, they benefit the mechanical condition of the soil in making it mellow and friable.

When the temperature drops so low some of these nights hang a lighted lantern in the cellar, about a foot from the floor making sure it cannot fall and set fire to the house. The heat from it may be enough to save the fruit and vegetables from freezing.

Better farming may lie in just such simple things as adjusting the plow to do the best possible work, in feeding stock so that not a bit of waste flows and in carrying out plans carefully laid. What the world needs is not so much men who have thousands to lay out in land and equipment as farmers who know the value of details and have the will and the disposition to work to the line.

Warm days between now and spring may be used to advantage, cutting out dead timber or branches that are too crowded among orchard or shade trees cut close to the shoulder so that the wound may readily heal next season. It is well in the case of trees to paint in order to prevent drying out and cracking.

Lettuce, in winter, is not a rarity on the table of the ordinary well paid laboring man, and it is freely offered, at moderate prices, in our grocery stores. We used to raise the more solid heading varieties, sorts of the tennis-ball type, under various names. It has become more difficult, however, to raise these nice, solid heads free from disease. The loose heading, curly-leaved Grand Rapids has now crowded the others out of cultivation in the green houses over a wide range of country. We can grow this if no other. It is little subject to disease. It is a pretty good lettuce to eat, too, and will stand close planting on greenhouse bench or in hotbeds or frames.

Imported from Europe. Recent lots have been found to contain from 15 to 80 per cent. of hairy vetch seed, the remainder being forms of spring vetch not hardy in the northern states or various species of wild vetches of doubtful value. The seed of hairy vetch is spherical varying from three thirty-seconds to five thirty-seconds of an inch in diameter, averaging about one-eighth of an inch. The seeds of most other vetches are more or less lens shaped flattened at the ends and varying in size. By spreading a small quantity of the mixed seed on a card board and gently shaking it the hairy vetch will roll off leaving behind most of the vetch seed that has been used as adulterant. The color of hairy vetch seed—grayish black, with a greenish tinge if fresh—is another test; also the lemon color of the crushed seed.

It seems hard to many farmers, but it is merely a matter of using pure-bred males for a few crosses. You start with females—cattle, sheep, hogs, fowls with no improved blood in them (pure scrubs) if you happen to be so unlucky as to possess them. Using a pure bred male, the scrub blood is reduced to fifty per cent. in one generation. In two generations, if falls to twenty five per cent. in three, to twelve and a half; in four, to six and a fourth, and the sixth cross will give you animals which will have about one and one-half per cent. of scrub blood in them. In four, 98.44 per cent. pure. There will be only a trace of scrub. For all practical purposes the herd or flock will be pure-bred. Of course, this means that you must have followed one pure-bred sire with another of the same breed. Vacillating from breed to breed will only give you a collection of mixed pickles very little better than the original scrubs. Grade up! It won't take so very long—and it pays.
