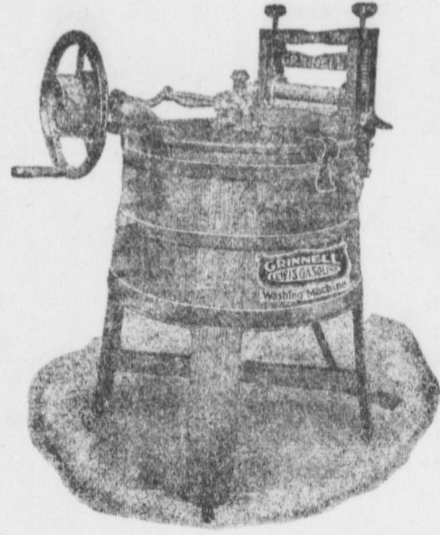
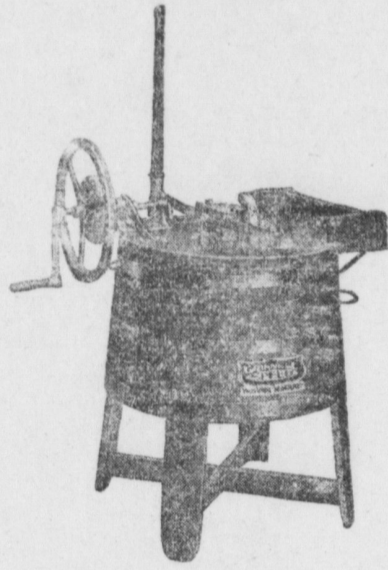
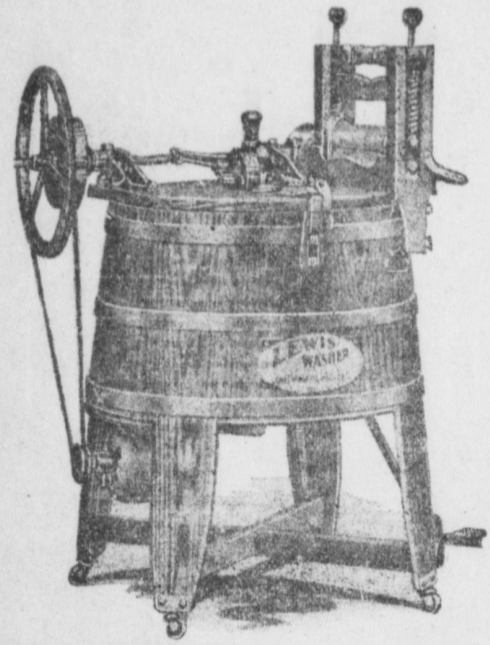

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IMPOSING ON DEALERS

A Tobacco Farmer "Doctors" His Filler Bales

An interesting case, and one that has caused more comment than usual, occurred in Manheim last week. That borough has become a great place for delivering tobacco, and never in its history has as much tobacco been received as this year. It is a common occurrence for several of the large firms to receive a quarter of a million pounds weekly.

Several weeks ago one of the firms discovered about a bushel of sweepings and offal and short tobacco stalks nicely packed in the centre of a bale of fillers. As they do not tag filler bales, it was impossible to tell who delivered it.

Last week the firm detailed one of the employes to examine each bale of fillers that was delivered that day, thinking that if the party that delivered the previous bale had not finished stripping, and as he was not detected in his first attempt would try it again. The D. M. employe performed his work faithfully, and up to four o'clock had not succeeded in finding the guilty party, and had almost given up hope of succeeding that day.

A prominent man of the northern part of the county then drove to the place where the tobacco was received and at once began unloading his fillers. After carrying in a few bales the long sought-for one was found. It was taken off the scales and opened, when to the surprise of all present, there was an exact duplicate—the centre of it was filled with sweepings, etc. The man stood by, apparently very much surprised, and remarked "that is to bad, the boys must have done that."

One of the boys was present and heard his father's remark, when he replied, "Father, you told us to do it." The father was caught and the son completed the job. The man offered to compromise matters, but he was given one of the planet and most effective sermons that was ever given to man by the man who had purchased the tobacco, and was told that he would not accept his tobacco if he gave it to him for a gift, and was told to take it home, which he did.

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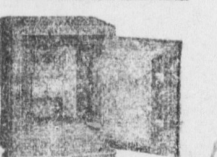

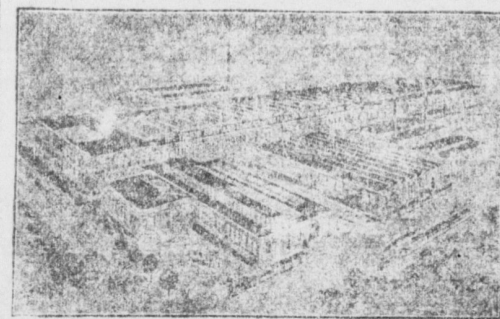
