HOME HEALTH CLUB

By Dr. David H. Reeder.

The following excellent article was written by Dr. Paul Burmaster especially for the Home Health Club.

The Eye in its relation to general diseases: The eye shares in many of the bodily diseases and ailments. In scarlet loss of sight sometimes occurs suddenly, lasts a few days, and is due to the toxins in the blood. Not infrequently certain eye muscles become paralyzed 4 to 6 weeks after an onset of diphtheria, remaining so for about a month. Diphtheria also causes what is called diphtheritic conjunctivitis, a rather severe affection of the eyelids. Whooping cough is apt to be followed by corneal ulcers on the surface of the eyeball, also by bright red spots (hemorrhages) in what is commonly called the white of the eyeball. These hemorrhages are caused by the bursting of small blood vessels from strain during coughing. Smallpox leads to ulceration and sometimes to destruction of the eyeball. The diphtheria affects of vile diseases are strongly attested by 100,000 blind children in Europe, made blind by infection from the parents, other children, or towels, etc., carrying the germs of the disease.

We differentiate four stages of syphilis, namely, primary, secondary, tertiary and hereditary. The eye may be affected in any of these even to utter and incurable blindness. Many cases of severe eye trouble have been reported after influenza. In malaria, hemorrhage into the eyeball is a serious complication. Lead poisoning, in itself a grave affection, enlarges the sight by causing inflammation and atrophy (wasting), of the optic nerve, a condition that is also brought about something by the excessive use of alcohol or the use in any quantity of wood alcohol. This wood alcohol which is sold under various names, is so much cheaper that unscrupulous manufacturers have used it as a substitute for grain alcohol, although the government forbids it. The overuse of tobacco produces in some sensitive persons symptoms similar to those caused by lead and alcohol poisoning, the affection being called nicotine poisoning. In this class of cases the poison or irritant which causes the inflammation of the optic nerve reaches the eye through the circulation of the blood.

In kidney diseases eye complications are rather common and indicate a serious state. In diabetes a cataract sometimes forms which has the peculiarity that it disappears when the diabetes is cured. In heart disease eye symptoms are quite frequent and during pregnancy temporary loss of sight is met with now and then. The different form of rheumatism affect the eye principally as follows: which is an inflammation of the iris, the colored curtain in the eye, which, according to its coloring, given gray, blue, brown and other eyes. What is called the pupil is merely a hole in the iris. In locomotor ataxia the visual field is contracted generally even to blindness from atrophy of the optic nerve. Large doses of quinine will bring on disturbances of vision as well as arising, from contraction of the arteries in the eye. Tumors of the brain cause pressure on the center of vision and meningitis, which is an inflammation of the membrane enveloping the brain, often is extended to the optic as well as the auditory nerve, with disastrous results.

Scrofula and a lowered vitality are productive of many cases of eye trouble which especially when neglected, develop serious hindrance to good sight. The eye is such a delicate and sensitive organ that even a slight irritation, if continued may produce serious consequences. Take, for instance, an ingrowing eyelash. It will irritate the surface of the eyeball (the cornea) until it loses its transparency, and becoming cloudy, sight may be lost or so impaired as to make the eye useless. This is a striking illustration of what neglect of the eyes will lead to. In no other class of cases is prompt attention so imperative as in affection of the eye. Although a wonderful organ, yet oculists differentiate not less than 125 distinct eye affections, and examinations in schools and other public institutions have shown a remarkably high percentage of imperfect eyes. A great German scientist said that if a manufacturer turned out goods as imperfect as nature turns out eyes, he would fail in business, yet with all their imperfections, we prize them above all other faculties, and many of us give them but little if any care, and abuse them to the limit of endurance.
